### ***Transportation Enhancement – Beautification Project***

Cabrini NA in collaboration with 3 other neighborhoods, has submitted a grant to receive federal Transportation Enhancement funds.

The half million dollar grant would create a shaded pedestrian way and improved bus stops along Glenn Street between Country Club and Columbus. The Glenn Street grant was ranked the number one proposal from Tucson and is now going through a final review by the State Transportation Enhancement Committee. We will hear back from the committee in a month or two, if we are awarded funding.

### Cabrini Fall Tree Planting Project

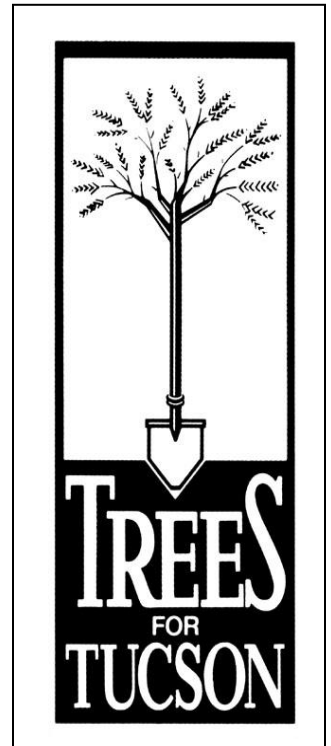

The following native trees are available through Trees for Tucson: ***Velvet Mesquite, Blue Palo Verde, Desert Willow, Ironwood, and White Thorn Acacia.***

The Cabrini Neighborhood Association can provide assistance with planting trees with a volunteer work crew and assist with paying for trees if residents have a financial need. When placing your order, please let us know if you need financial or planting assistance.

Here is more information on Trees for Tucson's program from their website:

"Owners of homes built in 1980 or later may receive up to two trees, and homes built in 1979 or before may receive up to four trees. You must be a TEP customer to qualify. You may submit an individual application, or compile applications with neighbors, co-workers, friends, or family members. Trees are delivered directly to homes, or a central location for group applications. Detailed planting and maintenance information is provided when the trees are delivered. Over 50,000 trees have been distributed through Trees for Tucson since Tucson Electric Power began its sponsorship in 1993. This program is conducted throughout the year."



### **OCTOBER Free Pro Neighborhoods Workshop PRESERVING THE NEIGHBORHOOD: Resources and Guides to Help You Work the System**

Tucson has a document called the Neighborhood Preservation Ordinance, a collection of all the sections of the Tucson Code **dealing with such issues as** “dilapidated vacant and nuisance structures, junked motor vehicles, slum property, graffiti, excessive noise, unruly gatherings, illegal dumping, and maintaining a public nuisance.” After general discussions about code violations and the new Landlord Accountability measures, we’ll get specific, how-to-cope information about taking care of the easements, graffiti, noise (including student neighbors), sign codes, and dogs (including insight into mandated mediation).

# Flu Vaccine Information for 2009 – 2010 Influenza Season



Annual flu vaccinations are highly recommended for certain categories. All children 6 months through 18 years of age, beginning in the **2009 -2010 influenza season**.

**People who should get vaccinated each year are:**

## **The groups recommended to receive the novel H1N1 influenza vaccine, when it becomes available, include:**

- Pregnant women because they are at higher risk of complications and can potentially provide protection to infants who cannot be vaccinated
- Household contacts and caregivers for children younger than 6 months of age because younger infants are at higher risk of influenza-related complications and cannot be vaccinated
- Vaccination of those in close contact with infants less than 6 months old might help protect infants by “cocooning” them from the virus
- Healthcare and emergency medical services personnel because infections among healthcare workers have been reported and this can be a potential source of infection for vulnerable patients. Also, increased absenteeism in this population could reduce healthcare system capacity
- All people from 6 months through 24 years of age
- Children from 6 months through 18 years of age because of the many cases of novel H1N1 influenza in children and they are in close contact with each other in school and day care settings, which increases the likelihood of disease spread

For vaccine availability and locations, please contact your doctor or healthcare provider.

***People with flu-like symptoms should stay home to avoid infecting colleagues, or classmates. Parents are encouraged to keep babies and young children away from people who have flu-like illnesses.***
