It was moved by Council Member Uhlich, duly seconded, and carried by a voice vote of 7 to 0, to forward liquor license applications 5c1 through 5c12 to the Arizona State Liquor Board with a recommendation for approval.

14. MEMORIAL: ASKING THE ARIZONA LEGISLATURE TO CONSIDER AND APPROVE "GENNA'S LAW"

(This item was taken out of order)

Mayor Rothschild announced City Manager's communication number 98, dated March 27, 2013, was received into and made part of the record.

Mayor Rothschild asked the City Clerk to read the Memorial by title only.

A Memorial relating to "Genna's Law"; asking the Arizona State Legislature to consider and approve House Bill 2631 or its equivalent to criminalize the unlawful discharge of a firearm while intoxicated.

Mayor Rothschild allowed the following people to speak on behalf of the Memorial; Toni Soldheld, Ericka Ayup, and Sara Ayup.

Council Member Cunningham thanked the speakers and announced that the bill was likely to obtain a hearing next year. In addition, he stated that the City Attorney

provided some corrections to the language of the bill, which would aid in its development.

It was moved by Council Member Cunningham, duly seconded, to pass and adopt the Memorial.

Council Member Kozachik offered a friendly amendment to the motion to direct the City Attorney to draft an ordinance so the Mayor and Council could adopt a local version of House Bill (HB) 2631.

Council Member Cunningham accepted the friendly amendment as presented by Council Member Kozachik.

Michael Rankin, City Attorney, commented if that was the direction of the Mayor and Council, that could be done to the extent of incorporating the provisions of the law into a local ordinance. He stated some changes were necessary due to the level of authority of the City and because of State preemption laws it would take some time to develop. He said he would bring the ordinance back when it was ready.

The motion to pass and adopt the Memorial, with the friendly amendment, was passed by a roll call vote of 7 to 0.

6. CALL TO THE AUDIENCE

Mayor Rothschild announced this was the time any member of the public was allowed to address the Mayor and Council on any issue except for items scheduled for a public hearing. Speakers were limited to three-minute presentations.

Mayor Rothschild also announced that pursuant to the Arizona Open Meeting Law, individual Council Members may ask the City Manager to review the matter, ask that the matter be placed on a future agenda, or respond to criticism made by speakers. Mayor Rothschild announced City Manager's communication number 102, dated March 27, 2013, was received into and made part of the record. He also announced this was a request to rezone the property located on the north side of Irvington Road, west of Houghton Road, from SR to RX-2 zoning. He said the Zoning Examiner and staff recommend approval of the RX-2 zoning.

Mayor Rothschild asked if the applicant or representative was present and agreeable to the proposed requirements.

Manda Silva, representative of the Manuela Krampel Trust, stated she was agreeable to the proposed requirements

Mayor Rothschild asked the City Clerk to read Ordinance 11061 by number and title only.

Ordinance No. 11061 relating to Zoning: amending zoning district boundaries in the area on the north side of Irvington Road, 400 feet west of Houghton Road in Case C9-12-15 Silva - Irvington Road, SR to RX-2; and setting an effective date.

It was moved by Council Member Scott, duly seconded, and passed by a roll vote of 7 to 0, to approve the request as recommended by the Zoning Examiner and pass and adopt Ordinance 11061.

9. **ZONING: (C9-11-14) INTRON INC. – TYNDALL AVENUE, R-2 TO C-3, CHANGE OF CONDITION, CITY MANAGER'S REPORT, DIRECT ORDINANCE ADOPTION AND AMENDING ORDINANCE 10971**

Mayor Rothschild announced City Manager's communication number 101, dated March 27, 2013, was received into and made part of the record. He also announced this was for a change of conditions for the rezoning site located on Tyndall Avenue; south of

23rd Street and west of South Park Avenue and amending Ordinance 10971. He said staff recommended approval of the requested change of conditions subject to the conditions provided in the proposed ordinance.

Mayor Rothschild asked if the applicant or representative was present.

No applicant or representative was present.

Mayor Rothschild asked the City Clerk to read Ordinance 11060 by number and title only.

Ordinance No. 11060 relating to Zoning: amending Condition 8 in Ordinance 10971, adopted April 10, 2012 and amending zoning boundaries in the area located on the east side of Tyndall Avenue, approximately 150 feet south of 23rd Street and 200 feet west of South Park Avenue in Case C9-11-14 Intron, Inc - Tyndall Avenue, R-2 to C-3; and setting an effective date.

It was moved by Council Member Fimbres, duly seconded, and passed by a roll vote of 7 to 0, to approve the request as recommended by the Zoning Examiner and pass and adopt Ordinance 11060.

10. ANNEXATION: TEP HOUGHTON ANNEXATION DISTRICT, ORDINANCE ADOPTION

Mayor Rothschild announced City Manager's communication number 100, dated March 27, 2013, was received into and made part of the record. He asked the City Clerk to read Ordinance 11058 by number and title only.

Ordinance No. 11058 relating to Annexation; extending and increasing the corporate limits of the City of Tucson, Pima County, Arizona pursuant to the provisions of Title 9, Chapter 4, Arizona Revised Statutes, by annexing thereto the TEP Houghton Annexation District Property in the vicinity of Golf Links Road and Houghton Road, more particularly described in the body of this ordinance; and establishing original City zoning classifications for the annexation area.

It was moved by Council Member Scott, duly seconded, and passed by a roll call vote of 7 to 0, to pass and adopt Ordinance 11058.

11. ANNEXATION: HOOVER AND HUGHES ANNEXATION DISTRICT, ORDINANCE ADOPTION

Mayor Rothschild announced City Manager's communication number 99, dated March 27, 2013, was received into and made part of the record. He asked the City Clerk to read Ordinance 11059 by number and title only.

Ordinance No. 11059 relating to Annexation; extending and increasing the corporate limits of the City of Tucson, Pima County, Arizona pursuant to the provisions of Title 9, Chapter 4, Arizona Revised Statutes, by annexing thereto the Hoover and Hughes Annexation District Property in the vicinity of Old Nogales Highway and Hughes Access Road, more particularly described in the body of this ordinance; and establishing original City zoning classifications for the annexation area.

It was moved by Council Member Fimbres, duly seconded, and passed by a roll call vote of 7 to 0, to pass and adopt Ordinance 11059.

12. TUCSON CODE: AMENDING (CHAPTER 22) TUCSON SUPPLEMENTAL RETIREMENT SYSTEM RELATING TO EMPLOYEE CONTRIBUTION RATES FOR MEMBERS HIRED AFTER JULY 1, 2006

Mayor Rothschild announced City Manager's communication number 107, dated March 27, 2013, was received into and made part of the record. He asked the City Clerk to read Ordinance 11062 by number and title only.

Ordinance No. 11062 relating to Tucson Supplemental Retirement System; Tucson Code Chapter 22, Pensions, Retirement, Group Insurance, Leave Benefits and Other Insurance Benefits, Article III, Tucson Supplemental Retirement System, Division 1, Types of Retirement and Benefits; amending Section 22-30, Definitions; Section 22-34(B), Variable Contribution Rates; and declaring an emergency.

Michael Rankin, City Attorney, requested to give an introduction on the ordinance. He stated the item had three separate issues that wanted to address each one individually to clarify their implications.

Mr. Rankin first discussed the amortization period with respect to the plan. He said, as discussed in Study Session on February 26, 2013 and described in the Mayor and Council Communication, the Tucson Supplemental Retirement System Board (Board) determined at a meeting earlier in the year that it was appropriate to extend the amortization of the plan from 15 to 20 years. He said that there seemed to be a consensus to accept the change at the Mayor and Council Study Session.

Mr. Rankin stated he wanted to make it clear that under the Tucson Code, this decision was within the authority of the Board. If the Mayor and Council were comfortable with the decision by the Board, no action was needed. If they wanted to disturb that decision, Mayor and Council needed to give him some contrary direction that involved Code amendments. He further stated that if Mayor and Council wanted to affirmatively endorse the decision made by the Board, they could accomplish that by a motion supporting the change to the amortization of the plan as determined by the Board.

Mr. Rankin said the second issue was with respect to the ordinance. He stated the proposed ordinance modified the calculation of the member contribution rates for all employees hired after July 1, 2006. The proposed modification changed the calculation

of that contribution rate from the existing rate of 40 percent of the Annual Required Contribution (ARC) to a different calculation that had a range of a minimum of 50 percent up to 100 percent of the normal cost as opposed to the total ARC. He noted that this contribution formula change could be accomplished by the Mayor and Council's adoption of the ordinance.

Mr. Rankin continued by saying that as described in the communication in connection with the item, there was also a recommendation that the contribution rate for Fiscal Year 2014 be established at the 50 percent level. He stated there was some discussion at Study Session about the Council's desire, for FY 2014, to set the rate somewhere else in that range, between that 50 and 100 percent. He said if that was the case, the Mayor and Council could still proceed with the adoption of the ordinance, which established the new methodology for the calculation of the members contribution and later make the decision on what the actual percentage would be for Fiscal Year 2014 as part of the overall budget discussions and decisions.

Mr. Rankin said if the ordinance was adopted there would be an annual determination where to set the rate each given fiscal year, which would be limited to 50 to 100 percent of normal. He said that decision would be recommended by the Board and decided upon by the Mayor and Council before the beginning of the fiscal year as part of the budget process.

Mr. Rankin pointed out that the existing Code also included a limitation on how much the rate could be changed in a given year, which was carried over in to the proposed ordinance. He said it could be adjusted anywhere in between the 50 and 100 percent range, but no more in a given year than two and one-half percent as measured by the employee's compensation, not fifty to fifty-two and a half to fifty five. He said it was the overall level of the employee's level of contribution, i.e., if the employees contribution was 6 percent, the most it could be increased the following year was 8.5 percent.

Mr. Rankin said the third issue, outside of the Ordinance, was the question of the City's level of contribution to the plan. He said he wanted to make it clear that because there was a change to the amortization period that the level of both the employee's and employer's contributions necessary to fund the 100 percent of ARC actually decrease, but it was the recommendation of staff that the employer contribution be kept steady at the Fiscal Year 2013 level to start paying off the unfunded liability of the Plan. He stated that needed to be an affirmative decision and direction by the Mayor and Council.

Mr. Rankin informed the Council they could take each item separately and if they were fine with the amortization change, they could acknowledge that and either include it in a motion or not. He said that if they did not take any action on it, that change would occur. He stated that with respect to the City of Tucson's level of contribution level to the Plan, he believed an appropriate motion, if comfortable with staff's recommendation, was to approve their recommendation and maintain the City of Tucson's contribution level at Fiscal Year 2013 levels.

Mayor Rothschild asked, in regards to part three, the City's level of contribution, did the Mayor and Council have an option at some point to reduce the City's contribution.

Mr. Rankin said the Mayor and Council had the option, but should, at some point, fund 100 percent of the ARC. However, the result to the amortization period meant that if the City continued to fund in FY 2014 at the same level of FY 2013, the City would be paying more than 100 percent of the ARC, which would be an investment into the plan to start paying off the unfunded liabilities.

Mayor Rothschild asked the Assistant City Manager, if that was part of the budget forwarded to the Council thus far.

Kelly Gottschalk, Assistant City Manager answered in the affirmative.

Mayor Rothschild requested that the Council first consider the amortization with a motion.

Council Member Kozachik stated he had a two part motion.

It was moved by Council Member Kozachik, duly seconded, and carried by a voice vote of 7 to 0, to endorse the amortization at 20 years to affirm the City's contribution rate as described in the proposal.

Council Member Kozachik voiced his concerns on the range of 50 percent to 100 percent and the unfunded liability of the Plan.

It was moved by Council Member Kozachik to adopt the methodology for the member contribution rate, but increase the proposal to a minimum of 65% of the normal cost.

The motion died for a lack of second.

Council Member Uhlich voiced her opinion.

It was moved by Council Member Uhlich, duly seconded, to proceed with the recommendation as presented.

Mayor Rothschild asked for clarification from Council Member Uhlich which Mr. Rankin answered. Mr. Rankin stated that proceeding with the recommendation as presented would adopt the ordinance and would set the member contribution rate for Fiscal Year 2014 at the 50 percent of normal.

Council Member Uhlich stated this was the recommended percentage and she wanted to proceed with the recommendation.

Council Member Cunningham gave reasons for his opposition to the Ordinance and warned the Council of what they were committing to. He urged the Council to consider the effect of the Ordinance on future decisions.

Mayor Rothschild asked staff for clarification if the contribution rate would be 6 percent if the motion was to pass.

Mr. Rankin responded that the contribution rates were in three tiers; the pre-2006 employees who were not subject to the Ordinance; member contributions based on the 50 percent for tier-one employees hired between July 1, 2006 and June 30, 2011 would be 6.715 percent; and those employees hired after July 1, 2011 would be 5.06 percent.

Mayor Rothschild asked if the Mayor and Council could move each latter tier up 2.5 percent if they chose to next year.

Mr. Rankin confirmed they could.

Mayor Rothschild asked if this could be done up to what it is currently.

Mr. Rankin said the Mayor and Council could move it up to 100 percent of normal.

Vice Mayor Romero and Council Member Uhlich voiced their support of the Ordinance.

Council Member Kozachik voiced his opposition to the Ordinance.

The motion to move forward with the recommendations and pass and adopt Ordinance 11062 and set the member contribution rate for Fiscal Year 2014 at 50 percent of the normal cost was passed by a roll call vote of 5 to 2 (Council Members Cunningham and Kozachik dissenting)

13. INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT AMENDMENT: WITH PIMA COUNTY REGARDING THE SOUTHEAST COMMUNITY PARK

Mayor Rothschild announced City Manager's communication number 109, dated March 27, 2013, was received into and made part of the record. He asked the City Clerk to read Resolution 22021 by number and title only.

Resolution No. 22021 relating to Parks and Recreation: adopting an amended and restated Intergovernmental Agreement between the City of Tucson and Pima County and requesting Pima County to amend the 2004 Pima County Bond Implementation Ordinance, changing the project scope for the Southeast Community Park by reallocating dedicated funds in the amount of six million dollars (\$6,000,000) of project funding primarily for land acquisition and minimal first phase development of the project; and declaring an emergency.

Council Member Scott introduced Nanette Slesher, Deputy Pima County Administrator, who gave a brief explanation on the Southeast Community Park and the 2004 Pima County Bond Implementation Ordinance.

It was moved by Council Member Scott, duly seconded, to pass and adopt Resolution 22021.

Mayor Rothschild asked Ms. Slesher what would happen if the County was not able to obtain the land.

Ms. Slesher responded by first reminding the Mayor and Council that the project in the ordinance is a City project. Thus, the County could not propose changes to the Bond Advisory Committee, only the City has the authority to do so. She stated that in the event they could not buy the parcel, the County would continue to look for land adjacent to it, and then bring it to the City for approval.

Mayor Rothschild inquired what would happen to the property if the County buys the parcel and expends most of the bond proceeds, but then the bond package does not pass.

Ms. Slesher remarked that she could not commit County future budgets, but that one of the reasons this parcel was so attractive to the County as well as the City is its historical significance. Therefore, the County would do its utmost to secure the site and keep it from future or further deterioration. She said the County was fully supportive of the City's decision and if the City does not pass the future bond package then the County would put it in a future bond package in order for the County to continue to develop it.

Council Member Uhlich thanked Council Member Scott for her initiative in partnering with the County.

Resolution 22021 was passed by a roll call vote of 7 to 0.

Mayor Rothschild announced City Manager's communication number 103, dated March 27, 2013, was received into and made part of the record. He asked for a motion to approve the appointments in the report.

It was moved by Council Member Fimbres, duly seconded, and carried by a voice vote of 7 to 0, to approve the appointments of Carlos Lozano as the Tucson-Pima County Historical Commission's Representative on the Downtown Links Citizen Advisory
