Mayor Rothschild asked the person who opposed the request to come forward.

Anthony Blackwell, a resident within 100 feet of the applicant's location, said he had lived there for over fifteen years. He spoke about the problems he had experienced with other similar businesses in the past with trash, vandalism, noise and traffic and expressed his concerns that this would happen again with this new business. He said all this was negatively impacting his property value.

Brian McBride, applicant, said his business would have shorter hours open than the other businesses in that area and did not see how this would add to the existing problems.

Council Member Cunningham asked Mr. McBride if he had met with Mr. Blackwell to discuss his concerns.

Mr. McBride said they had not met.

Council Member Cunningham asked what the timeline was for this application.

Roger W. Randolph, City Clerk, said action had to be taken by March 23, 2015.

Council Member Cunningham said he was under the impression that this was a Series 7 application, and that it was to be a tasting house selling only local craft beers, never staying open later than midnight on weekends. He said he was willing to make the recommendation, but wanted to meet with the two gentlemen to discuss the issues. He went on to say he was going to forward the application with no recommendation based on what he had heard that evening.

It was moved by Council Member Cunningham, duly seconded, and carried by a voice vote of 6 to 0 (Council Member Romero absent/excused), to forward liquor license application 5b5 to the Arizona State Liquor Board with no recommendation.

**6. CALL TO THE AUDIENCE**

Mayor Rothschild announced this was the time any member of the public was allowed to address the Mayor and Council on any issue except for items scheduled for a public hearing. Speakers were limited to three-minute presentations.

Council Member Kozachik said he would address the concerns since they had been formed as a criticism directed at the Mayor and Council. He said there had been multiple meetings between the Tucson Police Department (TPD) command staff, the Main Gate, 4th Avenue Downtown Merchants Association and the University of Arizona administration to prepare different protocols. TPD also sent officers to Florida and Wisconsin to see how they handled these types of situations. He said everything he had heard had led him to believe that the right steps had been taken.

Mayor Rothschild announced City Manager's communication number 98, dated March 17, 2015, was received into and made part of the record. He asked the City Clerk to read Resolution 22372 by number and title only.

Resolution No. 22372 relating to Development and Real Property; authorizing and approving the Development Agreement and the Payment in Lieu of Tax (PILOT) Agreement between the City of Tucson (City) and HomeGoods Inc. (HomeGoods) for a Distribution Center Development Project (Project).

Vice Mayor Fimbres stated before making the motion, he wanted to ask Mark Walker, TJX Companies, Inc. Vice President of Real Estate, to come forward.

Mark Walker, TJX Companies, Inc. Vice President of Real Estate, thanked the Mayor and Council and staff for their efforts to bring business to the region and expressed how happy he was that the project was coming to Tucson.

It was moved by Vice Mayor Fimbres, duly seconded, and passed by a roll call vote of 6 to 0 (Council Member Romero absent/excused), to pass and adopt Resolution 22372.

**8. PUBLIC HEARING: MAJOR STREETS AND ROUTES PLAN AMENDMENT (PA-14-02), GRANT ROAD ALIGNMENT BETWEEN ORACLE ROAD AND SWAN ROAD**

Mayor Rothschild announced City Manager's communication number 94, dated March 17, 2015, was received into and made part of the record. He also announced this was the time and place legally advertised for a public hearing on a request to amend the Major Streets and Routes Plan to reflect the alignment for Grant Road, between Oracle and Swan Road. He said staff wanted to give a brief presentation before the public hearing.

Nicole Ewing-Gavin, Office of Integrated Planning Program Director, explained that this was an administrative process to codify the alignment for Grant Road that was approved by the Mayor and Council in 2009. She said this step was not completed at that time and since then, staff had gone through the public process, public meeting, public hearing and approval with the Planning Commission.

Mayor Rothschild said the public hearing was scheduled to last for no more than one hour and speakers were limited to five minute presentations. He asked if there was anyone wishing to speak on the item.

There were no speakers.

It was moved by Council Member Cunningham, duly seconded, and carried by a voice vote of 6 to 0 (Council Member Romero absent/excused), to close the public hearing.

Mayor Rothschild asked the City Clerk to read Resolution 22369 by number and title only.

Resolution No. 22369 relating to Transportation and Planning: amending the Major Streets and Routes Plan (MS&R Plan), PA-14-02, Grant Road alignment between Oracle Road and Swan Road.

It was moved by Council Member Uhlich, duly seconded, to pass and adopt Resolution 22369.

Council Member Kozachik asked for an explanation as to why the references to the three segments noted in note number two were being deleted.

Ms. Ewing-Gavin said those segments referred to old specific plans for old rights of way on Grant and were being replaced with the new specific plan from Oracle to Swan.

Council Member Kozachik asked staff to describe the planned public process that would begin the following day that discussed the design elements along the corridor.

Ms. Ewing-Gavin said the Grant Road Corridor Planning Task Force would meet on March 18, 2015 to discuss land use planning for the five mile corridor. A corridor vision was to be adopted first then move on to land use planning tools and implementation by way of a segmented approach looking at three phases of the corridor timed with the design of those phases.

Council Member Kozachik said he knew Catalina Vista and Blenman-Elm Neighborhoods were National Register historic districts, both of which project to the center line of the corridor. He asked if the design process involved discussion regarding protection and buffering of these districts.

Ms. Ewing-Gavin said the City was currently in phase two of design between the Stone and Park area and more detailed designs would flesh-out a specific line on the ground. She said that they were still adopting an alignment concept and design work would be more specific in terms of an engineered alignment. She stated that what the Mayor and Council were adopting that evening was not an engineered alignment for phases two through six.

Council Member Kozachik asked if getting the engineered alignment would be when the design components of the MS&R were engaged. He also said that Grant Road was not a gateway, like Broadway Blvd. He said the design specifications that appeared in the MS&R for gateway projects was not applicable, but there was still be a design discussion for the elements contained in the MS&R.

Ms. Ewing-Gavin said that was correct.

Resolution 22369 was passed and adopted by a roll call vote of 6 to 0 (Council Member Romero absent/excused).

**9. ZONING: (C9-14-12) SURF THRU CAR WASH - PANTANO ROAD, C-1 TO C-2 ZONING, CITY MANAGER'S REPORT AND DIRECT ORDINANCE ADOPTION**

Mayor Rothschild announced City Manager's communication number 85, dated March 17, 2015, was received into and made part of the record. He asked the City Clerk to read Ordinance 11249 by number and title only.

Ordinance No. 11249 relating to Zoning: amending zoning district boundaries in the area located on the east side of Pantano road, approximately 150 feet south of Broadway Boulevard in case C9-14-12 Surf Thru Car Wash - Pantano Road, C-1 to C-2; and setting an effective date.

Council Member Cunningham said his staff had met with the developer early in the process to get things ironed out and it was a good infill project that was approved by the Zoning Examiner. He said the developer was present at the meeting and mentioned there was a late protest that he believed had been worked out.

Kevin Hall, Cypress Civil Development, Principal Engineer, for the project, said a protest was received the day of the Zoning Examiner hearing. He said the protest consisted of two sentences; they did not believe this was a complimentary use to the existing adjacent retail, and there was concern about policing adjacent properties for litter and security.

Mr. Hall said as far as the first concern, it was a car wash facility which brought vehicles into the area which would be a good thing for adjacent retail. He said his client immediately wrote a lengthy email addressing the concerns about litter and security, noting there would be an on-site dedicated employee during all hours of operation. He said they had met with and worked with the adjacent owner who protested to work out cross access to the north to the existing retail development, but he was now concerned about access to the east to his other undeveloped parcels. He stated they were currently analyzing that proposition which was, in his opinion, unrelated to the original protest.

Council Member Cunningham said once the potential development site changed they could come back to the table.

Roger W. Randolph, City Clerk, announced this item required a three quarter majority vote.

It was moved by Council Member Cunningham, duly seconded, and passed by a roll call vote of 6 to 0 (Council Member Romero absent/excused), to pass and adopt Ordinance 11249.

**10. PRE-ANNEXATION AND DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT: WITH ALEX ORTEGA, JR., OWNER OF PARCEL NO. 132-23-197B, FOR WATER SERVICES**

Mayor Rothschild announced City Manager's communication number 92, dated March 17, 2015, was received into and made part of the record. He asked the City Clerk to read Resolution 22367 by number and title only.

It was moved by Vice Mayor Fimbres, duly seconded, and passed by a roll call vote of 6 to 0 (Council Member Romero absent/excused), to pass and adopt Resolution 22367.

Mayor Rothschild announced City Manager's communication number 93, dated March 17, 2015, was received into and made part of the record. He asked the City Clerk to read Resolution 22368 by number and title only.

Resolution No. 22368 relating to Finance; a Resolution of the Mayor and Council of the City of Tucson, Arizona approving amendments to the \$15,000,000 Industrial Development Authority of the City of Tucson, Arizona and Industrial Development Authority of the County of Pima Joint Revolving Taxable Single Family Mortgage Program of 2012 approving an increase in the maximum program amount to \$40,000,000 from \$15,000,000; approving the Amended & Restated Standards & Requirements; approving the Amended & Restated Intergovernmental Agreement; approving amendments to program documents related thereto; and declaring an emergency.

Council Member Uhlich acknowledged and thanked Marilyn Robinson for her leadership of a significant expansion of a program started in 2012 aimed at alleviating the shortage of mortgage credit for persons of low and moderate incomes.

It was moved by Council Member Uhlich, duly seconded, and passed by a roll call vote of 6 to 0 (Council Member Romero absent/excused), to pass and adopt Resolution 22368.

Mayor Rothschild announced City Manager's communication number 97, dated March 17, 2015, was received into and made part of the record. He asked the City Clerk to read Resolution 22371 by number and title only.

Resolution No. 22371 relating to Labor Relations; providing for the holding of an election to determine which labor organization, if any, shall be recognized by the City of Tucson (City) as representing the employee group consisting of commissioned personnel of the Tucson Police Department (TPD) through the rank of sergeant; and declaring an emergency.

It was moved by Council Member Kozachik, duly seconded, and passed by a roll call vote of 6 to 0 (Council Member Romero absent/excused), to pass and adopt Resolution 22371.

Council Member Kozachik commented that the League of Women Voters was a good neutral choice to conduct and supervise the election and asked when the ten day meter began.

Roger W. Randolph, City Clerk, said the labor union petition for the Fraternal Order of Police Tucson Labor Association (FOPTLA) was certified on March 6, 2015 which started the ten day clock. There was a petition filed by the Tucson Police Officers Association (TPOA) on March 13, 2015 and if they were certified as sufficient they would also appear on the ballot.

**16. APPOINTMENTS TO BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS**
