The Community Services Department is directed to:

- 1. Submit the adopted update of the Consolidated Plan to HUD for review and approval.
- 2. Work with the designated Council aides to develop a city wide strategy and redesign for the existing Housing Rehabilitation Programs and Emergency Home Repair. The strategy should include an evaluation and recommendations on the eligibility criteria and process; contractor selection and bidding process; and should be submitted to Mayor and Council prior to the release of the 2000-2001 CDBG RFP.
- 3. Provide a specific status report and presentation to Mayor and Council on the 25 homes referred to in the memo Neighborhood Target Areas Survey Analysis of Waiting List Applicants, dated October 23, 1998. The report shall be presented within 90 days and shall include an individualized list with project status: i.e.: complete, underway, demo/rehab, projected cost, and timeliness of the completion of each eligible unit. The report should also include a summary of new resources that could be leveraged with the current budget to expedite the closing out of the list. Confidentiality of applicants will be protected.
- 4. By September, 1999, research existing loan programs and analyzes the applicability of expanding these programs to encompass CDBG funded projects.
- 5. Within the same timeframe, work with Council Offices to establish criteria for 2 year funding for CDBG supported public services programs.

In reference to the above adopted CDBG projects:

Funding for the Haven Facility Sprinkler System is limited to the current year allocation.

Funding combination for Habitat, TMM, and Urban League project Habitat/TMM ReStore Acquisition & Tucson Urban League Remodeling breaks down follows:

\$50,000 TMM \$50,000 Habitat for Humanity

The balance of funds will be set aside for cost overruns by the City of Tucson Community Services Department.

Priority for reallocation for public services will be granted to CPLC Corazon De Aztlan. Priority for reallocation for public facilities will be granted to the Dunbar Coalition, the Dunbar Project, Tucson-Pima Arts Council, Toole Youth Center Rehabilitation Project.
