VETERANS DAY: Veterans Day means a lot to me. As your Council Member for Ward 5, I continue my work to instill the values of patriotism in young people and for them to remember those who served this nation in the military, through work with our Veterans' groups and the Veterans Day Parade and support from our city government for this.

On Sunday, November 5, 63 active and retired veterans were recognized for their service during the 2023 Veterans Recognition Luncheon, which was held at the Kay-Cee Club, 601 S. Tucson Blvd.. These individuals were nominated by their fellow citizens to thank them for serving our nation.

I along with my staff coordinated the twelfth annual event, which was done not at taxpayer expense but through private donations. Council Member Fimbres expressed his thanks to his staff: Lupita Robles, Mark Kerr, Mary Kuchar and Daniel Conorque for their work.

I want to thank U.S. Senators Mark Kelly and Krysten Sinema, Congressman Raul Grijalva, Congressman Juan Ciscomani, Arizona Governor Katie Hobbs, Pima County Supervisors Adelita Grijalva, Rex Scott, and Dr. Matt Heinz, as well as Tucson Mayor Regina Romero, who joined him in presenting the 63 honorees Certificates of Appreciation to the veterans for their service. I also gave Ward 5 Military Coins to the honorees.

Twenty-one year Army veteran, Matthew Langseth, delivered the keynote address, talking about the City of Tucson Skillbridge Program, which hires veterans for city employment. Pima County Supervisor Rex Scott and Tucson Ward 4 Council Member Nikki Lee were present for the event and spoke to those in attendance, thanking them for their service and accompanying family members for their support and sacrifice.

Retired Pima County Supervisor Dan Eckstrom emceed and Little Mexico catered the luncheon. The Kay-Cee club provided the venue and Jerry Neely provided the music. Monique Loya performed the National Anthem. American Legion Yoemi Post 125, under the command of Commander Jose Hernandez and the Desert View High Junior ROTC and Commander Robert Jaramillo, provided the color guard. NOVEMBER 2023



On Thursday, November 9, I made my Ward 5 fourteenth annual delivery of thank you cards and letters to veterans and the staff at the Southern Arizona V.A. Hospital. These cards and letters were made by school kids from 23 schools across Tucson and Pima County.

Twenty-three schools made more than 4,100 thank you cards and letters to the Veterans and staff at the V.A. The schools were: Los Ninos Elementary, Roberts Naylor K-8, Alta Vista High School, Craycroft Elementary, Drachman Montessori, Drexel Elementary, Esperanza Elementary,

Gallego Intermediate, Liberty Elementary, Los Amigos Tech Academy, Miles Exploratory, Mission View Elementary, Ocotillo Learning Center, Our Mother of Sorrows Catholic School, Pistor Middle School, Pueblo Gardens, Rivera Elementary, St. Joseph Catholic School, St. Peter & Paul Catholic School, Tucson International Academy, White Elementary and Wright Elementary.

Jennifer Gutowski, the Director of the Southern Arizona VA Medical Center accepted the cards along with staff from the V.A. I want to thank Lupita Robles from my office who coordinated this effort, as well as Mark Kerr and Mary Kuchar.

HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS: Here are some holiday safety tips: Be responsible and don't drink and drive. Stay alive and put your phone down to drive. Keep kids safe by paying special attention to hazards in the kitchen. Follow food safety rules, especially when it comes to cooking the turkey. Be proactive about protecting yourself from stress. Don't leave cooking food unattended. Be aware of fire hazards while cooking and entertaining. Make sure your kitchen is fully equipped in case of a fire. Find a safe place outside to fry your turkey. Make sure your turkey has thawed and is dry before deep frying outside. Dress smart when you fry your turkey outside. Keep your pets away from dangerous and toxic foods. Don't make your Thanksgiving travel plans obvious. Secure your home against break-ins. Be careful and use caution. Please don't become a statistic and end this holiday in a tragedy.

SMOKE SHOPS: At the November 14, Mayor and Council Regular meeting, the public hearing on Smoke Shops was finished and discussion ensued. I want to thank my colleagues on the Council for their unanimous support of the measure that mandated new smoke shops to be a half a mile apart from each other, limit their hours from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m., 1,000 feet away from schools, parks and churches and put in place a stricter review of plans and applications for new smoke shops. I also want to thank all the citizens, many community organizations, such as LPKNC, TPD who spoke out on smoke shops. It is a good first step taken by the Mayor and Council.

CITY ELECTION: The 2023 City of Tucson Election Canvass was reviewed at a special meeting of the Mayor and Council, held November 21. The results of the political contests for Mayor, and the Ward 1, Ward 2 and Ward 4 Council seats were reviewed and approved. I want to congratulate my colleagues: Regina Romero on her election to continue as Mayor, and Lane SantaCruz, Paul Cunningham and Nikki Lee to continue as the Council Members for Wards 1, 2 and 4 respectively. At the meeting, the discussion about the results of Proposition 413 took place, which the tabulation showed a margin of 289 votes in favor. Proposition 413 was referred to the ballot by the Citizens Salary Commission, which voters had approved to set up in 1993 to review Mayor and Council salaries every two years and for the voters of Tucson to consider their proposals. For Proposition 413, the Mayor and Council voted to direct the City Attorney to contact the Arizona Attorney General and Arizona Secretary of State about the Proposition 413 vote total, as well as filing a motion in Pima County Superior Court on whether state statutes apply or to order a recount.

HOMELESS ENCAMPMENT PROTOCOL & REPORTING TOOL: The Homeless Encampment Protocol is initiated when a homeless camp, located on City property or private property, poses a threat to public safety, causes a major criminal or health concern, or when there is camping in any City park after hours. The encampment online reporting tool will allow our community to help the City identify encampment locations and assess the level of response needed, including outreach, clean-up, and enforcement. NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION MEETINGS: Neighborhoods in Ward 5 are meeting again in person. Ward 5 has many neighborhood associations and with the pandemic, some stopped meeting or had virtual meetings. HIGH-EFFICIENCY CLOTHES WASHER AND TOILET REBATES AVAILABLE: Tucson Water customers can apply to get rebates when purchasing and installing qualifying high-efficiency toilets and/or clothes washers. Single-family rebates are \$100 for the purchase of a qualifying high-efficiency clothes washer or replacing your old front-loading machine with a new front-loading machine. Get a \$200 rebate if replacing your old top-loading machine with a new front-loading machine. Residential, multi-family, and commercial customers can also get a \$100 rebate when buying Premium High-Efficiency toilets. Qualifying low-income customers can purchase a discounted high-efficiency clothes washer for \$200. LOW-INCOME WATER CONSERVATION SERVICES: Qualifying Tucson Water customers can apply to receive grants and loans to install rainwater harvesting and gray water irrigation systems. In partnership with SERI (Sonoran Environmental Research Institute), participants can receive up to \$1,000 in grants and \$2,000 in zero-interest loans and SERI will cover the upfront cost of the project. Other programs include our discounted high-efficiency clothes washer where eligible customers can purchase a machine for only \$200 that can be paid with a zero-interest loan and our FREE toilet replacement services in partnership with Community Home Repair Projects of Arizona (CHRPA) where customers that are homeowners can receive up to 2 toilet replacements at no cost. RAINWATER HARVESTING (up to a \$2,000 rebate) & GRAY WATER (up to a \$1,000 rebate) - The Tucson Water Conservation Program offers rebates for installing rainwater harvesting and permanent gray water irrigation systems. Taking advantage of these opportunities in your home can help conserve water and save you money! A free, three-hour workshop and submission of a project plan are required to qualify. Check out the upcoming workshop dates and our Rainwater & Gray Water Pressurized System - Backflow Prevention Requirement informative video. GET THE LEAD OUT: Many homes built before 1978 have paint that is lead-based. Lead from paint chips and dust can pose serious health hazards if not handled properly.

Children in older homes are often poisoned by lead dust and lead paint. Lead dust can come from simply opening or closing a window or door or other normal wear and tear of painted areas. Lead dust falls to the floor and gets on children's hands and toys. It enters their bodies when they put their hands or toys into their mouths. Lead paint can cause health and behavior problems in children. It can make them less able to learn when they are at school. Lead poisoning can affect a child for a lifetime.
