Topics Discussed over the last year

The following were presentations and/or topics discussed at Commission meetings in 2023 and 2024 year-to-date:

- Review of the HUD Housing Choice Vouchers utilization within Tucson.
- Completed and reviewed the Equity Study which was developed by the ASU grad students for the City of Tucson.
- Reviewed current homelessness trends and data collection in Tucson, including the point-in-time count and the needs assessment and bed utilization.

 Recommend establishment of an affordable housing goal for the City of Tucson of 15,000 units by the year 2030.

- Reviewed the City of Tucson's Housing Trust Fund, which currently has a balance of \$312,449 and discussed updating the policy on how those funds are used and replenished.
- Assisted with the evaluation of proposed projects submitted to the City of Tucson for supplemental funding under the City of Tucson's P-CHIP program. The following projects received a recommendation for funding from the City based on the presentations received:
 - Casa del Pueblo Rehab (CPLC)
 - El Camino Apartments (Casa Maria/Compass Affordable Housing)
 - Rincon Manor (Spire Development)
 - Shasta Apartments (La Frontera)
 - Tucson House (CoT & Gorman)
- Working with Laurice Walker, the Chief Equity Officer for the City of Tucson, to better define housing equity
- Received updates on the P-CHIP initiative and are providing feedback to staff on the proposed goals and programs.
- Reviewed the Prosperity Initiative documentation to understand how it can support the City's affordable housing goals.
- Working with Planning and Development Services on the proposed changes to Impact Fees and the new Zoning Overlay, which can help promote infill housing.
- Attempting to collaborate with Pima County's affordable housing commission to explore the potential for an affordable housing bond initiative to be added to the ballot.

Revised Goals and Subcommittees

The CEHD held an on-site retreat in February to revisit the commissions mission statement and goals, including the three subcommittees. Below are the results of that retreat:

SUBJECT: Quarterly Update to Mayor and Council

The Commission will review, investigate, and recommend actions to the Mayor and City Council, based on research, data, and inclusive public input, to ensure that all Tucsonans have equitable, accessible, and affordable housing.

- 1. Develop and preserve affordability for all Tucsonans, including renters, homeowners, and those without housing.
- 2. Protect barrios and communities from rapid change and displacement as well as structural disinvestment, recognizing past harm and advocating for efforts to repair past harm and mitigate future harm.
- 3. Identify and reduce barriers to creating and maintaining equitable, accessible, and quality affordable housing.
- 4. Serve as a forum for community collaboration and education around issues of equitable, accessible, and quality housing.
- 1) Affordable Housing (Chair: Jim Tofel)
 - a. Provide a set of recommendations to Mayor and Council on activities / levers / tools the City can leverage to preserve and increase affordable housing (short-term and long-term goal)
 - b. Identify and advocate for new funding sources for preserving and creating affordable housing (short-term and long-term goal)
 - c. Establish and monitor progress towards a goal of 15,000 affordable housing units by 2030 including both rental and home ownership, within the City of Tucson.
 - d. Make recommendations to Mayor and Council to streamline the housing development processes and identify regulations that are barriers to development
- 2) Housing First (Chair: Tisha Tallman)
 - a. Recommend policies from other housing first programs in similar cities, including emergency interim responses be implemented.

b. Recommend program and service models used by other cities' housing First programs

- Recommend implementation ideas at the intersection of housing first and the Prosperity Initiative
- 3) Equitable Housing Strategies (Chair: Jay Young)
 - Gather, share, and maintain research about equitable housing policies and advocacy around the country, with a focus on how they address housing segregation and equity
 - b. Work with City of Tucson departments to provide recommendations to CEHD for Mayor and Council on equitable housing strategies
 - c. Collaborate with the City of Tucson to develop a set of indicators to measure housing equity in Tucson over time, including race, ethnicity, disability, income, and access to opportunities in Tucson, recognizing that housing patterns show the legacy of racism.

Action Items for the Mayor and Council Members

- 1. There are two vacant seats that we would like to request Mayor and Council fill.
- 2. Approve the affordable housing goal for the City of Tucson of 15,000 units by 2030.
