Dear Friends:

As we celebrate a new year, we are still facing a rise of COVID-19 cases in Tucson, Pima County, Arizona and this nation.

State health officials reported, as of January 18, 2022, another 23,836 COVID-19 cases bringing the total to 1.65 million and the total number of deaths to 25,395. The Pima County Health Department reported another 2,383 cases of COVID-19, bringing the total number of cases to more than 250,000 and the total number of deaths to 3,342.

Hospital officials in Pima County report medical resources and staff are strained and the COVID-19 cases they are dealing with are from unvaccinated people.

Health officials are offering vaccinations seven days a week at various locations.

I have worked with Pima County Supervisors Adelita Grijalva and Dr. Matt Heinz, as well as Dr. Theresa Cullen and the Pima County Health Department to set up pop-up vaccination sites in Ward 5 and the South side.



I am working with City Manager Michael Ortega to get a supply of KN-95 masks distributed to the public.

Young people ages 12-17 can get the COVID-19 vaccine and the booster shots. Children ages 5-11 can get the COVID-19 vaccine.

We all need to get tested, vaccinated and boosted. We all need to wear our masks, practice social distancing, wash our hands and be careful. For more information, call the Pima County Health Department, (520) 724-7770. It is a new year and we need to make a new start and work to end this pandemic.

Ward 5 Update: The new year has begun and the Renaissance of Ward 5 continues. The Mayor and Council recently gave approval to a new aeronautics firm at the airport bringing 50 jobs. A new hotel is being constructed, 288 units of housing, two new affordable housing projects, four new restaurants and three new industrial warehouses in the Tucson Airport area, this is the first quarter of this year.

32nd Annual PGNA 2022 MLK Jr. Virtual Breakfast Held: I invited the community again to join me over the MLK Holiday Weekend, to celebrate the life and legacy of Martin Luther King Jr. by virtually attending the 32nd Annual Pueblo Gardens MLK Breakfast.

For the last two years, we have worked with the City Manager's Office to help the Pueblo Gardens Neighborhood Association Breakfast Committee to continue the event. This Breakfast has served as a fundraiser, which is traditionally held at the Boys and Girls Club, for the Pueblo Gardens Neighborhood Association non-profit serving the youth of the neighborhood and the Tucson community by providing scholarships and funding educational opportunities while promoting service.

The City of Tucson Poverty and Urban Stress Report shows an upturn in high school graduations and GED attainment in Ward 5. As a former Pima College Governing Board Member and your Council Member, I have worked to get the message out that education is the key to success. It was great to have young people, Terri and Brandi Starks and the Starks Family who sang the National Anthem, Tianna Williams who sang the Black National Anthem, "Lift Every Voice and Sing," and inspiring words from Cassius Chandler, the youth speaker for this year's event.

Ward 5's Pueblo Gardens Neighborhood Association is the only neighborhood in Tucson that hosts an annual event to honor the work and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. In the 31 years of the event, the Pueblo Gardens Martin Luther King Jr. Breakfast has raised thousands of dollars for educational scholarships, school supplies, textbooks and computers for students in the Pueblo Gardens and surrounding neighborhoods.

I want to thank James Christopher and the Pueblo Gardens Martin Luther King Breakfast for their work these 32 years on the Breakfast and for bettering the lives of young people through their efforts.

I want to thank Pima County Supervisor Matt Heinz for his participation, Tucson Mayor Regina Romero for her participation and issuing a City of Tucson Proclamation for Martin Luther King Day. Low Income Water Program Expanded: The Mayor and Council has taken the first step in designating the funds from raising water rates for Tucson Water customers in unincorporated Pima County by expanding the utility's low-income program.

The council adopted changes to improve access to Tucson Water's low-income program while providing emergency assistance to customers experiencing hardships.

When the Mayor and Council adopted differential water rates in June, it identified three spending areas to allocate the \$9.9 million annual revenue it anticipates generating from the new rates: low-income assistance, climate resiliency and infrastructure upgrades.

With the new guidelines, customers seeking assistance can self-attest to the number of people in their homes without having to provide Social Security numbers.



And when customers provide proof of participation in public assistance programs such as Section 8, SNAP and Head Start, they will automatically qualify for a 25% discount.

The Mayor and Council also approved an emergency hardship program for customers experiencing job loss, serious illness or family loss regardless of their income. Silvia Amparano, Deputy Director with Tucson Water said that it is anticipated this assistance will be available by March 1.

Customers who can provide documentation proving one of these circumstances will be eligible for a credit up to \$150 based on their need and availability of program funds. The average customer's water bill is \$42 a month, so the program would grant about 3½ months of coverage, on average.

One idea for the program's expansion is to extend water discounts to renters. In order to qualify for water discounts, Tucson Water customers must have the utility statement in their name — a requirement many renters do not meet.

Staff told the mayor and council that one concept is to create an agreement between renters and landlords who have the utility in their name. If both parties agree to the discount, the amount could be removed from the tenant's rent.



Congratulations to the Pantano Christian Church for their Donation to the Tucson Homeless Work Program: The Pantano Christian Church, during their Christmas Eve Ser-

vices, raised \$100,000 for the Tucson Homeless Work Program, to continue its work as a five day a week program.

I had met with Pastor Glen Elliott to discuss the Tucson Homeless Work Program, its work and its successes for the program. Pastor Elliott presented the program for consideration to the Pantano Christian Church congregation.

I want to thank Pastor Roger Blumenthal and Pastor Glen Elliott for selecting the Tucson Homeless Work Program for their Christmas Eve Services, as well as their wonderful Congregation, for their generosity in raising \$100,000, and the potential second work crew.



The Tucson Homeless Work Program has been in existence for five years and was formed by Ward 5 Council Member Richard Fimbres. More than 900 people have been through the program, cleaning 300 sites, more than 280 miles of roadway and 290,000 pounds of trash have been cleared. The Homeless Work Program has received national, state and local recognition and awards from various professional organizations and civic groups.

Cool Pavement: The Department of Transportation and Mobility (DTM) has teamed up with the University of Arizona College of Architecture, Planning and Landscape Architecture (CAPLA) for a pilot project to collect data on the performance of cool pavements. This pilot project includes a PlusTI asphalt rejuvenator treatment that was applied in mid-December 2021 on Country Club Road between Broadway and Aviation Parkway. This application is the first cool pavement treatment applied in Tucson! Crews will return in January to crack seal and restripe the roadway. The University of Arizona CAPLA



gathered emission levels, ambient temperatures as well as other data in October of 2021 and will return in March of 2022, when temperatures are similar, to conduct the same data collection and to compare the information before and after the cool pavement application.

Legacy Businesses: The Tucson Legacy Business Program recognizes locally owned businesses that have bee in the community for at least 25 years for their role in shaping Tucson's unique identity. Legacy businesses are featured in the City's new Legacy Business Registry, in City of Tucson marketing materials, and will receive priority consideration for City programs (as available).
