LETTER

from Council Member Fimbres Dear Friends,

Cinco de Mayo is the holiday held on May 5, commemorating the Mexican Army's victory over French Forces at the Battle of Puebla on May 5, 1862, under the leadership of General Ignacio Zaragoza Seguin. In the U.S., Cinco de Mayo has taken on significance beyond that in Mexico and the date is best recognized in the United States as a date to celebrate our culture and experiences of Americans of Mexican ancestry.

Latinos have had a profound and positive influence on our country through their commitment to family, faith, hard work and service. They have enhanced and shaped our national character with centuries old traditions that reflect the multiethnic and multicultural customs of their community. Through the years, Latin Americans have played an integral role in our Nation's success in science, the arts, business, military service, government and every other field of endeavor and their talent, creativity, and achievement continue to energize our national life.

The United States is a melting pot of a country made of and made for immigrants. But the Latinos have been in this area for thousands of years. And to say our culture has little impact on our community, would be a major understatement.

PARKS AND REC CENTERS UPDATE

Beginning Monday, May 2, Tucson Parks and Recreation will resume pre-pandemic center hours and programing. All lobbies, game rooms, locker rooms, and showers will be open, and there will not be restrictions on group size, except for maximum capacities. In addition, the on-site <u>Senior Meal Program</u>, a partnership with Pima Council on Aging (PCOA) and Catholic Social Services, will return to normal operating hours and locations. Senior transportation will resume for specific sites. Senior and youth programs will once again offer field trips and luncheon events. Masks are no longer required at City facilities but are still recommended where physical distancing is not possible. A facility membership or a daily fee will be required for recreation center access.

I want to especially thank State Representative Andrea Dalessandro who was our champion in the Arizona Legislature, who is working on HCM 2002, to have the Arizona Legislature again go on record in support of Tucson and Southern Arizona's post office and processing center. A celebration will take place to mark this victory for Cherrybell and for our community in this 11-and-a-half-year battle for Tucson.



On Friday, April 8, our office hosted a ceremony to recognize 5 high school sportscasters for the excellent work they have demonstrated throughout the years. Their coverage of high school sports is of upmost importance to the City of Tucson and its residents, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic. GAP MINISTRIES GRAND OPENING

I had the privilege of taking part in the dedication and ribbon cutting of GAP Ministries new and bigger location, Thursday, March 31. Joining me were Tucson Ward 3 Council Member Kevin Dahl, Oro Valley Mayor Joe Winfield and Marana Town Manager Terry Rozema. I presented Ward 5 Medallions of Hope to the leadership of GAP Ministries who does so much



for those in need in our community. Congratulations on your new location and efforts, which will help more people.

PROPOSITION 411

The City of Tucson is asking the good citizens to extend the existing temporary half-cent sales tax for an additional 10 years. This extension will not increase the City's current sales tax rate of 2.6%. The funds collected through the half-cent sales tax over the 10-year period will be used solely for neighborhood street improvements and system-wide street safety projects. The estimated sales tax revenue over this 10-year period is projected to be \$740 million to be used solely for improvements to neighborhood street conditions and system-wide street safety. Of that estimated funding, 80%, or \$590 million, will be dedicated to improving the condition of City neighborhood streets; and 20%, or \$150 million, will be dedicated to safe street improvements that benefit all users and modes. Safety improvements can include projects such as street lighting, sidewalks, bicycle network enhancements, traffic signal technology upgrades, and traffic-calming features.

Accountability and oversight commissions ensure that the funds collected from the temporary half-cent sales tax are only spent for the purposes approved by voters. Over the last decade, citizens' accountability and oversight commissions have served taxpayers by overseeing and monitoring projects and expenditures for the voter-approved 2017 half-cent sales tax and both the Proposition 409 and 407 bond packages. The Independent Oversight and Accountability Commission will select and prioritize Proposition 411 neighborhood street improvement projects. The City's Complete Streets Coordinating Council, a group of citizens appointed by the Mayor and Council, in addition to technical experts, will oversee the selection of Proposition 411 safe street projects. The four major safe street project categories and corresponding funding allocations include:

Category	Percentage	Estimated Funding*
Sidewalk and Pedestrian Accessibility Improvements	30%	\$45M
Bicycle Network Enhancements	20%	\$30M
System-wide Safety Improvements	30%	\$45M
Traffic Signal Technology Upgrades	20%	\$30M
Total	100%	\$150M

*Funding totals are based on projected tax sales tax revenues.

TEP UPDATE

Tucson Electric Power (TEP) had their first virtual public meeting, Thursday, April 14 on the proposal for their TEP Kino to DeMoss Petrie Transmission Line.

From 2019 through 2021, community discussions and stakeholder meetings had been held on proposed routes for this powerline. On September 1, 2021 TEP had filed their preferred route application with the Arizona Corporation Commission, going through many Ward 5 neighborhoods and others across the Wards in Tucson, and for which the proposed route had been voted down by stakeholders previously in 2019.

Ward 5 neighbors and citizens across our City, made their comments known to TEP on this, something I wish to thank them for again during the initial process.

TEP's filing came on the same day as the



Mayor and Council meeting to discuss this issue, which I made the motion to have the Mayor and Council go on record, formally opposed to the route, known as 5A and to all actions to ensure this route was not approved. I want to thank my colleagues on the Council for their unanimous support of this motion.


