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LETTER

from Council Member Fimbres
Dear Friends:

We have received the good news from Congressman Raul Grijalva that the U.S. Postal Service has announced it is ending all area mail processing (AMP) studies to consolidate mail processing facilities. This means that the AMP study at the Tucson Processing and Distribution Facility (Cherrybell) will end. Here is the news release:

The Postal Service announces that it is ending all open area mail processing (AMP) studies to consolidate mail processing facilities. This process ramped up in 2011 with hundreds of facilities being



studied for consolidation. Currently, 57 AMP studies are still open, and these open studies will be ended. In Arizona an AMP study at the Tucson P&DF located at 1501 S Cherrybell will end.

The Postal Service is moving forward with the Delivering for America Plan, which includes strategies for the development of a mail processing network that enables more precise, efficient, and reliable service. By using best-in-class logistics practices, the Postal Service is driving efficiency and service performance improvement to fuel revenue growth and customer retention.

Most importantly, the plan establishes a new operating model that dramatically improves on-time delivery performance. As part of this plan, the Postal Service will re-assess the role of all processing facilities. The Postal Service will adhere to all legal, statutory, contractual and regulatory requirements as this network design is developed.

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AUGUST 2022

President Joe Biden signed the Postal Reform Act in April and this announcement from the Postal Service about Cherrybell is our victory in the 11 ½ year battle to keep Tucson and Southern Arizona's post office and processing center, which serves more than 1.5 million people, 26,000 small businesses, the Pascua Yaqui Tribal Nation and the Tohono O'odham Nation, Seniors and Veterans open.

I want to thank Congressman Raul Grijalva, who has been a part of this effort since 2011, as well as the Pima County Recorder F. Ann Rodriguez, State Representative Andrea Dalessandro and Connie Sadler Nelson with the Postal Workers Union.

I want to thank Arizona's current Congressional and Senatorial delegation for their work for Cherrybell, as well as those who previously served and worked for our post office and processing center from both sides of the aisle: Senator Martha McSally, Senator Jeff Flake, the late Senator John McCain, Congressman Ron Barber and Congressman Mark Meadows, the former chair of the House Government Operations Committee.

I want to thank my colleagues on the Council, past and present, for their support of Cherrybell.

I want to thank our federal lobbyists, Tracy Tucker and BTBV and the City of Tucson IGR Director, Andrew Greenhill for their work.

I want to thank everyone, residents, business owners and concerned citizens, who wrote in, emailed, and called in support for Cherrybell.

With hard work, perseverance and determination, we did it! Victory!

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22ND STREET BRIDGE

August 11 was a great day for Ward 5 and the City of Tucson. Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg was in Tucson to announce the awarding of the \$25 million RAISE Grant for the construction for our 22nd Street Bridge. These additional funds will go to the reconstruction of the bridge.

I, along with other elected officials, had the opportunity to meet

the Transportation Secretary and thank him for this grant. I presented the Transportation Secretary the Ward 5 Medallion of Hope and the Ward 5 First Responders and Military Coins. I had also sent a letter to the Transportation Secretary urging him to support the RAISE Grant application.

I am grateful to President Biden and Secretary Buttigieg for awarding \$25 million to Tucson for the 22nd Street Revitalization Project. These funds will allow us to reconstruct the bridge and make improvements along a major transportation corridor that will enhance access for drivers, pedestrians, and bicyclists alike. I want to thank our Mayor and my colleagues on the Council, the City Manager and staff for their support and successful effort. Neighborhood/public open house meetings will begin in the next 30 to 45 days as the work on the bridge itself will not begin until early 2023.

PARKS PROJECTS

There are two Park Master Plans that were on the Mayor and Council agenda August 9, for consideration, Jacobs Park in Ward 3 and Santa Rita Park in my Ward. My office worked with Parks, surrounding neighborhoods, the Neighborhood Association, community groups, the skateboarding community, City Staff, the City Manager's office as well as the Mayor's office.



So far, more than a year and half of time has been invested in the Santa Rita Park effort. The public process involved three virtual meetings held in January 2021, June 2021 and April 2022, as well as three in-person meetings at the park in November 2021 and April 2022.

There were also two online surveys in June 2021 (239 responses) and November 2021 (375 responses). This included efforts at the park by staff to get responses. Paper surveys were also provided to neighborhood leaders to distribute in the neighborhood. Social media posts, advertisements, and signs in the parks and neighborhoods were also part of this effort. A total of 8,430 postcards were mailed to households in October 2021. In addition, a total of 279 emails were received by the city.

This was an effort to compile a plan, not start construction, displace anyone or gentrify the area. It is a starting point and the discussions can change plans as we have seen with other Proposition 407 projects to what further the neighborhoods want, as we saw with Gunny Barreras and Cherry Avenue, both in my Ward, and Mission Manor, Joaquin Murrieta, Iron Horse, Barrio Nopal, Santa Rita, Jacobs, and many other future projects. This is a part of Proposition 407, the voter approved Parks Bond measure, for which there will be further discussion under the auspices of Proposition 407.

Also, the Housing and Community Development Department, Housing First and the City's Homeless Outreach Team will also be involved, working with our homeless population at the park as well to help those who want services. There have been issues with the parks safety, which I had to move the Tucson Raiders Football and Cheerleading Program out of Santa Rita to another location, as well as assaults, including a 75 year old woman, stabbings and a murder at the park.

This effort is to reactivate Santa Park for the community, the young, young at heart, skateboarders, baseball and softball players and the families. Nothing more and nothing less. I want to thank the City Manager, the Parks Director and city staff for answering these questions and getting this out to the public on the work that had been done on the Santa Rita Park Master Plan project. I also want to thank my staff for their work on this which will benefit Ward 5.

STILL BEING A GOOD NEIGHBOR

Parking: Parking your vehicle is a permitted use on any portion of a property provided the vehicles do not block City right-of-way (sidewalks, alleys). Also, when you park your car, please don't block access to your neighbor's mailbox or driveway. If you are intending to have an event, be courteous and let your neighbors know about the event and when parking will be available on the street. Please ensure all vehicles have current registration and are operable.



About your trash: To reduce flies and odor, please bag and securely tie all your trash and do not overfill containers. Never place hot ash or coals, or other burning materials in containers. Yard waste may be disposed of, as long as it fits within the container with the lid closed. Don't leave your containers out past your pick up date. Please return it to the space you have it in your yard.

For any damaged trash containers and to find out your trash pick up date, either call Environmental Services at (520) 791-3171 or go online to maps2.tucsonaz.gov/zoomtucson/

Please have your trash and recycle containers out to the street and on those days, please try not to block mail boxes and driveways. Residential recycling is collected every other week. To check your schedule, go to www.tucsonaz.gov/es/residential-recycling and type in your address or use the Recycle Coach app to view your schedule, set up reminders, or submit a service request.

Brush and Bulky: Environmental Services offers Brush and Bulky twice a year. Environmental Services will pick up 10 cubic yards of materials with the following guidelines: They will take brush, cacti (must be contained), lumber up to five feet, scrap metal, piping up to five feet, appliances, refrigerator and freezers with doors removed, automobile tires (limit five), and home furnishings.

Environmental Services will not collect: Dirt, stone, concrete, gravel, glass, household hazardous waste (i.e. paint, oil, pesticides and liquids).

Cleaning up after your dog: It doesn't take much to remember that we have pets in our community. In fact, if you don't watch your step, you are liable to step in one such reminder! Besides being unsightly and smelly, animal waste can be hazardous to the health of our children who play in the community and other pets. One of the most common forms of disease transmission between dogs is through fecal matter. When walking your dog out in our community, remember that it should be leashed. Also, it is important to remember to immediately clean up after your pet. Take along a baggie with you to pick up waste and then dispose of it properly. By taking a few simple steps to clean up after your pet, you can contribute not only to the beautification of our community, but also towards the elimination of one of the most irritating nuisances in our community.

Loud Parties and Red Tags: With the start of a semester come loud parties. Although I understand student excitement about the school year, there are codes that are in place and must be followed. A loud party or unruly gathering can result in a red tag, which has several consequences. If red tagged, a visible "red tag" will be placed in street view, notifying the neighborhood of the issuance. The red tag comes with a fine and if a college student is involved, a report to the Dean of



Students of the respective school. The "red tag" states that if another unruly gathering occurs within
