

These individuals were nominated by their fellow citizens to thank them for serving our nation.







22ND STREET BRIDGE REVITALIZATION: The Department of Transportation and Mobility (DTM) would like to invite you to take part in the 22nd Street Bridge Revitalization Project.

The next public meeting is December 8, at the Quincie Douglas Center, 1575 East 36th Street, 5:30 p.m., for the public to participate and meet with DTM staff and the contractor to discuss the travel impacts during construction, provide information on the overall project and answer any questions. The 22nd Street Bridge will be widened to a six-lane divided roadway to match the lane configurations on each end of the project. These improvements would increase the operational capacity and would remove the bottleneck created by the current four-lane configuration. The 22nd Street bridge is structurally deficient and will be replaced with a new bridge along the same alignment with a separated pedestrian and bicycle facility. The replacement of the existing weight-restricted bridge would eliminate the need for truck detours and provide more direct lines of travel for freight and transit.
