CINCO DE MAYO: Cinco de Mayo is the holiday held on May 5, commemorating the Mexican Army's victory over French Forces at the Battle of Puebla on May 5, 1862, under the leadership of General Ignacio Zaragoza Seguin.

Tucson is the only city to adopt a holiday honoring the work and legacy of Cesar Chavez and has had Dolores Huerta at Tucson's Cesar Chavez Holidays and celebrations. As we reflect on the Latino contributions in this great country, let us not lose sight of where we, as Americans, Arizonans, Tucsonans need to go.

HOMELESS ENCAMPMENT PROTOCOL & REPORTING TOOL: The Homeless Encampment Protocol is initiated when a homeless camp, located on City property or private property, poses a threat to public safety, causes a major criminal or health concern, or when there is camping in any City park after hours. The encampment online reporting tool will allow our community to help the City identify encampment locations and assess the level of response needed, including outreach, clean-up, and enforcement. WASHER AND TOILET REBATES: Tucson Water customers can apply to get rebates when purchasing and installing qualifying high-efficiency toilets and/or clothes washers. Single-family rebates are \$100 for the purchase of a qualifying high-efficiency clothes washer or replacing your old front-loading machine with a new front-loading machine. Get a \$200 rebate if replacing your old top-loading machine with a new front-loading machine. Residential, multi-family, and commercial customers can also get a \$100 rebate when buying Premium High-Efficiency toilets. ADU HELP: Tucson homeowners who have an Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) on their property that needs improvements can obtain financial and technical assistance from a new program created by the City of Tucson's Housing and Community Development (HCD) department. The program is aimed at low-income homeowners who live on their property and wish to upgrade their backyard casitas or have existing structures that can be converted into ADUs. Applicants must have a gross annual income equal to or less than 80% of the Area Median Income. The owner-occupied property must be within the City limits, and mortgage and tax payments must be current. Applicants will be able to repair or replace gas, electrical, and water lines, refurbish kitchen and bathroom cabinets, and make other on-site improvements. The program does not allow new construction or total remodeling. More information on HCD's Home Repair Program can be found at: https://www.tucsonaz.gov/hcd/home-owner-programs.

22nd STREET BRIDGE PROJECT: Preparations continue ahead of construction on the 22nd Street Bridge Revitalization Project between Kino Parkway and Tucson Boulevard. The Department of Transportation and Mobility (DTM) held four public meetings and met with nearby neighborhoods to share the design and get feedback from residents.

The contractor, Old Pueblo Segmental Constructors, a joint venture between Malcom International and KE&G, and DTM are working on the final details before work can begin in late Spring. Public pre-construction meetings will be scheduled prior to the project starting to update the traveling public and residents on impacts and schedule. When work begins on the bridge, 22^{nd} Street will close to all travel between Tucson Boulevard and Warren Avenue, as well as the on and off ramps to Aviation Parkway. The 22^{nd} Street Bridge will be widened to a six-lane divided roadway to match the lane configurations on each end of the project. These improvements would increase the operational capacity and would remove the bottleneck created by the current four-lane configuration. The 22nd Street bridge is structurally deficient and will be replaced with a new bridge along the same alignment with a separated pedestrian and bicycle facility. The replacement of the existing weight-restricted bridge would eliminate the need for truck detours and provide more direct lines of travel for freight and transit. It is springtime and for many middle school and high school students and their families that means promotion, prom and graduation festivities. During this exciting time, LPKNC would like to offer you these reminders to ensure that this celebratory season is a healthy and safe time for all.

Unfortunately, one third of all alcohol related traffic deaths involving teenagers occur between the months of April, May, and June. In addition, you will find that most youth will not use substances. It is for this reason that LPKNC **encourages** parents to communicate their expectations about underage drinking and substance abuse with their teenager. Talk to your teen about underage drinking, buzzed driving and drugged driving (using marijuana and driving). Parents have the best opportunity to influence their teenager's decisions and attitudes.

We would like to remind parents that it is illegal to buy or provide alcohol or marijuana to anyone under 21. Also it is important to know that if you choose to host a party where underage drinking is occurring, you can be held liable for any minor who drinks alcohol on your property and subsequently harms themselves or others.
