#### **Letter from Council Member Fimbres**

Dear Friends:

Memorial Day means a lot to me as a 27 ½ year retired Army veteran.

As your Council Member for Ward 5, I continue my work to instill the values of patriotism in young people and for them to remember those who served



this nation in the military. I work to ensure the City works with our Veterans groups and that we will have an in-person, Veteran's Day Parade this year and I am proud to take part in this parade, prior to the pandemic.

For the past thirteen years, during Memorial Day and Veteran's Day, a contingent of elected officials, groups and organizations join me in going out to the Southern Arizona V.A. Hospital to present thank you cards to veterans at the hospital or getting treatment and the VA hospital staff for their work. More than three dozen schools across Tucson and Pima County, as well as groups and organizations, have volunteered to make thank you cards for our veterans.

To remember the 396 Tucsonans of the Greatest Generation, who volunteered to serve our country during World War II and made the ultimate sacrifice, I worked to ensure the completion of the World War II Memorial that is located in Armory Park. This was the idea of the late Gilbert Quintanilla, who had served our country and saw our community had no memorial to those Tucsonans who served and died in World War II. I want to thank my colleagues on the Council for their support and vote to move the Memorial, as well as their support and votes for the City's Veterans Parade and for programs the city offers to help veterans in Tucson.

Thank you to the families of those who served our nation in the military. To all those who served and made the ultimate sacrifice, God bless you and you are not forgotten. Here is the Veteran's Prayer:

"Dear Lord, we honor our veterans, worthy men and women who gave their best when they were called upon to serve and protect their country. We pray that you will bless them, Lord, for their unselfish service in the continual struggle to preserve our freedoms, our safety, and our country's heritage, for all of us. **GUNNY BARRERAS PARK REOPENING**: City of Tucson Mayor Regina Romero, Ward 5 Council Member Richard Fimbres, Tucson Water's "Storm 2 Shade," and Tucson Parks and Recreation are pleased to announce the grand reopening of CSM Martin R. "Gunny" Barreras Memorial Park, located at 5890 S. Campbell Ave., Saturday, June 3, 10 a.m. This park was developed and renovated to provide beautiful, safe, and enjoyable outdoor spaces for the community.

This park features a variety of new amenities, including a new playground with shade, a new ramada, and a splash pad. The



renovation of the existing track surface, the addition of a new walking path, and the renovation of the irrigation system ensure that the park is in excellent condition for all outdoor activities.

The project was primarily funded by a \$7.04 million budget allocated from the 2018 voter-approved general obligation bond dollars. In addition, the park is a recipient of a \$500,000 Arizona State Parks American Rescue Plan Act Grant, \$150,000 of American Rescue Plan Federal funding for fitness equipment, and \$220,282 from Tucson Water's award-winning "Storm 2 Shade" Green Infrastructure funding.

We are thrilled to open the CSM Martin R. "Gunny" Barreras Memorial Park to the public once again. I want to thank all the neighbors, Sunnyside High School, the Sunnyside School District, and the stakeholders who took part in this process. This park is a tribute to CSM Martin R. "Gunny" Barreras' legacy and will provide a safe and enjoyable space for residents, and the community, to gather and engage in all of the outdoor activities and enjoy all the wonderful amenities the park will have to offer.

The City of Tucson is proud to re-dedicate this park to the memory of CSM Martin R. "Gunny" Barreras, a true hero who served his country and community with distinction.

The grand opening ceremony will take place on Saturday, June 3, from 10-11:30 a.m., and will feature speeches from City officials, special guests, and members of the community. Attendees will also enjoy food and drinks and have the opportunity to explore the new amenities and enjoy the park's facilities. Tucson Parks and Recreation's "Ready, Set, Rec!" mobile recreation van will be there with lots of fun and games for the whole family.

**HOMELESS ENCAMPMENT PROTOCOL & REPORTING TOOL**: The Homeless Encampment Protocol is initiated when a homeless camp, located on City property or private property, poses a threat to public safety, causes a major criminal or health concern, or when there is camping in any City park after hours.

The encampment online reporting tool will allow our community to help the City identify encampment locations and assess the level of response needed, including outreach, clean-up, and enforcement. **PROPOSITION 411 UPDATE**: At the Mayor and Council Meeting, an update on Proposition 411, the Road Repair and Complete Streets Plan approved by voters. Work has begun on road projects listed under the proposition, which at the end of its 10 year run, all neighborhood streets will be worked on. In this first year, in Ward 5, streets in Julia Keen, Rodeo Addition, South Park Cherry Avenue area, as well as Bilby - Campbell to 12th Avenue. **CINCO DE MAYO**: Cinco de Mayo is the holiday held on May 5, commemorating the Mexican Army's victory over French Forces at the Battle of Puebla on May 5, 1862, under the leadership of General Ignacio Zaragoza Seguin. In the U.S., Cinco de Mayo has taken on significance beyond that in Mexico and the date is best recognized in the United States as a date to celebrate our culture and experiences of Americans of Mexican ancestry.

Latinos have had a profound and positive influence on our country through their commitment to family, faith, hard work and service. They have enhanced and shaped our national character with centuries old traditions that reflect the multiethnic and multicultural customs of their community. Through the years, Latin Americans have played an integral role in our Nation's success in science, the arts, business, military service, government, and every other field of endeavor and their talent, creativity, and achievement continue to energize our national life. In Tucson and Pima County, Latinos have sent a strong message by turning out to vote and leading the state in the number of Latinos that have been elected to governing bodies. In a recent article in "Inside Tucson Business," entitled "Hispanics a Key to Tucson's Rebound," it discussed the importance of buying power of the Latino Community in Tucson, Pima County and throughout Arizona.

It noted, "the Latino impact on the local and national economy and that their purchasing power represents \$8 billion per year in Pima County, a number that is expected to increase by 88% in the next decade." By 2024, Latinos are estimated to spend \$14 billion in the Tucson economy, equating to 28 percent of the total market spending. Hispanics are the largest group that has earned the Medal of Honor and have a wall dedicated with their names and how they earned their accommodations at the Pentagon. Sixty-one men of Hispanic heritage have been awarded the Medal of Honor, the most of all groups.

Of the Sixty-one Medals of Honor presented to Hispanics, two were presented to members of the United States Navy, thirteen to members of the United States Marine Corps and forty-six to members of the United States Army. Forty-two Medals of Honor were presented posthumously. The United States is a melting pot of a country made of and made for immigrants. But the Latinos have been in this area for thousands of years. And to say our culture has little impact on our community would be a major understatement. I have worked to give the Latino community more economic opportunities by getting new businesses opened and current businesses to expand, resulting in more than 20,000 jobs since taking office as your Ward 5 Council Member.

Latinos also represent the fastest growing segment of the American electorate and served in many offices, including: Raul Castro, Arizona's first Latino Governor; Ed Pastor, Arizona's first Latino Congressman and today there are three Latinos in Congress representing Arizona: Raul Grijalva, Ruben Gallego and Juan Ciscomani; Victor Soltero, Ramon Valadez, the late Olivia Cajero Bedford and Rosanna Gabaldon, who served or are serving in the Arizona Senate; Alma Hernandez Consuelo Hernandez, Andres Cano, Daniel Hernandez and Tom Prezelski, who served or are serving in the Arizona House; Dan Eckstrom, Ramon Valadez, the late Richard Elias and Adelita Grijalva who served or are serving on the Pima County Board of Supervisors; F. Ann Rodriguez as Pima County Recorder, Jennifer Eckstrom, Bob Teso and Paul Diaz who served or are serving as Mayor of South Tucson; Marco Lopez served as Mayor of Nogales and Tucson, with its first Latina Mayor in its 144 year history, Regina Romero, as well as Lane Santa Cruz, as the Ward 1 Council Member, along with myself, serving Ward 5 as your Council Member.

Tucson is the only city to adopt a holiday honoring the work and legacy of Cesar Chavez and has had Dolores Huerta at Tucson's Cesar Chavez Holidays and celebrations. As we reflect on the Latino contributions in this great country, let us not lose sight of where we, as Americans, Arizonans, Tucsonans need to go forward.

We must continue to work together to solve the challenges of today, so our community and our children will have a better tomorrow.
