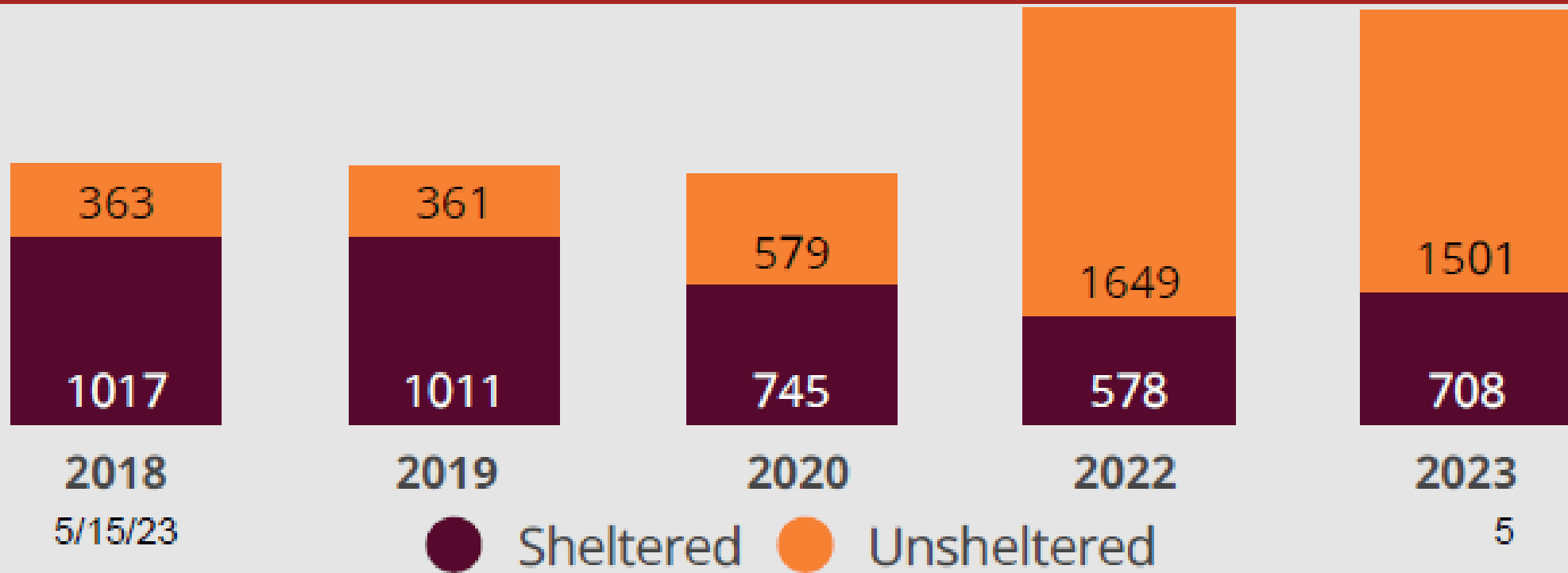
2023 POINT IN TIME COUNT

January 25, 2023

- 2,209 people experiencing homelessness on single night (1,501 unsheltered).
- 300% increase in unsheltered homelessness since 2018.
- Persons experiencing homelessness are twice as likely to be unsheltered than they are to be sheltered.
- Shelter bed utilization increased by 22% since 2022.
- 200% increase in chronic homelessness since 2018 (789 persons on the night of the 2023 PIT).

HOMELESS NEEDS ASSESSMENT

APRIL-JUNE 2023

- 389 adults experiencing homelessness surveyed.
- 28% of respondents over the age of 55.
- 51% had been homeless for 1 year or longer.
- 40% reported having ever completed a housing assessment.
- Shelter/housing, food security, transportation, laundry, shower/bathroom facilities among the most commonly unmet needs.
- 60% of respondents who stayed in shelter/housing programs described their experience as positive.

Estimated Annual Cost = \$118.1M-\$165.4M

Most critical shortfalls in bed availability exist in programs serving non-veteran adults, older adults, and survivors of domestic abuse/human trafficking.
