Letter from Council Member Fimbres

Dear Friends:

June 3 was a great day for Ward 5 and the South side with the ribbon cutting and reopening of Gunny Barreras Park, with the new amenities, including the new Splash Pad.



This park was named in honor of Chief Master Sergeant Martin “Gunny” Barreras, who paid the ultimate sacrifice serving our nation during Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan, in 2014.

The project was primarily funded by a \$7.04 million budget allocated from the 2018 voter-approved general obligation bond dollars. In addition, the park is a recipient of a \$500,000 Arizona State Parks American Rescue Plan Act Grant, \$150,000 of American Rescue Plan Federal funding for fitness equipment, and \$220,282 from Tucson Water's “Storm 2 Shade” Green Infrastructure funding.

Gunny Barreras Park features a variety of new amenities, including: a new playground with shade, a new ramada, and a splash pad; the renovation of the existing track surface, the addition of a new walking path, an exercise court and the renovation of the irrigation system ensure that the park is in excellent condition for all outdoor activities.



I want to thank all the neighbors, Sunnyside High School, the Sunnyside School District, and the stakeholders who took part in this process. I want to thank my colleagues on the Council for supporting my efforts for the park.



I want to thank Tucson Parks and Recreation Director Lara Hamwey and her team for their work on this project.

I want to thank everyone who came out for the dedication, as well as the Barreras family, Assistant City Manager Liz Morales, Tucson Water Director John Kmeic, as well as Edgar Soto, President of Pi-ma College Desert Vista Campus for their presence at the dedication, work and support for our park.



I want to thank Sunnyside School District Superintendent Jose Gastelum and SUSD Board Members, President Beki Quintero, Bobby Jaramillo, Consuelo Hernandez, Ted Rodriquez, and Edgar Bustamante, for their work and Marcos Moreno for his advocacy for the park naming and helping to preserve Gunny Barreras' memory and legacy. I want to thank my staff, Lupita Robles, Mary Kuchar and Mark Kerr for their work on this. It was a great day for Ward 5, for our neighborhoods and for the south side.

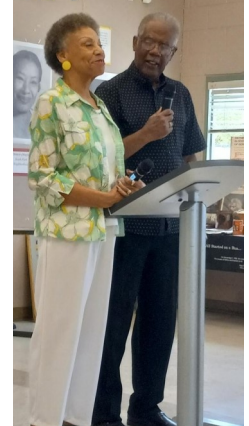

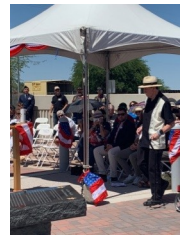

GOLD STAR FAMILIES MEMORIAL MONUMENT DEDICATED: On Tuesday, May 30, a new Gold Star Families Memorial Monument (GSFMM) honoring the families of servicemen and women who sacrificed their lives while serving in the military was dedicated at Veterans Gold Star Family Park in Tucson.

Families, servicemembers, veteran organizations, first responders, Pima County Supervisor Rex Scott and I were present for this dedication of the first Gold Star Monument in Tucson, the first monument for the families of military service members who paid the ultimate sacrifice defending this nation, in Tucson and Southern Arizona.

During my remarks, I said that wreath laying ceremonies and memorials have been held in Tucson and Southern Arizona prior and he was proud that this Monument was created and dedicated to the families. Many families in Tucson have lost their sons and daughters, including Martin Lugo Jr., Chris Moon, Darrell Kasson, Stefano Panchesin and others.



The Gold Star Family Memorial was created by Medal of Honor Recipient Hershel "Woody" Williams to remember those families.

Our soldiers and our families' loved ones died defending our freedoms and we must never forget them. This monument will continue their memories.

I want to thank Barbra Brownlie, and the committee and everyone with this effort for their work and commitment.

I want to thank everyone, including the Pima County government and City of Tucson, for their efforts for this monument.



This Monument was a private/public partnership, with funding from Pima County, as well as the Gold Star Monument organization and businesses. This effort honors those families, and we will never forget the service members for their sacrifice. I also thanked the American Patriot Memorial for their work, and Bobby Rich, who emceed the event.

As part of the Gold Star Families Memorial Monument effort, I had designated \$7,000 in funding to help with the costs to honor those families who lost loved ones, that paid the ultimate sacrifice while serving our nation in the military.

Part of the monument is the plaque, for which I want to thank Barbara Brownlie and the members of the Committee for this recognition. We will never forget.

HOMELESS ENCAMPMENT PROTOCOL & REPORTING TOOL: The Homeless Encampment Protocol is initiated when a homeless camp, located on City property or private property, poses a threat to public safety, causes a major criminal or health concern, or when there is camping in any City park after hours.

The encampment online reporting tool will allow our community to help the City identify encampment locations and assess the level of response needed, including outreach, clean-up, and enforcement. TOM CHABIN: Arizona Attorney General Kris Mayes is committed to fostering a positive relationship with southern Arizona by promoting open communication and working with cities like Tucson on the issues facing municipalities and their constituents. One example is AG Mayes' reversal of the prior Attorney General's opinion on the legality of Tucson's source-of-income ordinance. Attorney General Mayes is fully committed to promoting and fostering productive relationships with local government partners across the state. As such, Attorney General Mayes has designated Tom Chabin as a liaison for Community Outreach. Mr. Chabin is based in Tucson and is actively reaching out to various civic and elected leaders to foster improved communication and make the resources of the Attorney General's Office more accessible to southern Arizonans.

DONOVAN DURBAND: I want to extend my condolences to the family of Donovan Durban on his sudden passing, a loss for the City of Tucson and the many events and organizations he worked with as Park Tucson Director. I had the privilege of working with Donovan when he was also at the Ward 6 Council Office, as well as his time as Park Tucson Director on the Tucson Change Program, for which he worked to get the parking meters which could accept credit card donations, as well as the placement of these in downtown to the U of A and out to the airport. For much of his career, Park Tucson Administrator Donovan Durband, was a champion for Downtown Tucson. His contributions in helping revitalize downtown were honored over the weekend at arts events and venues, even having the main music stage at 2nd Saturdays Downtown Tucson renamed in his honor. Before Park Tucson, Durband served as a council aide in Ward 6 and was executive director of the Downtown Tucson Alliance, vice president of the Southwest Parking and Transportation Association, a board member of 2nd Saturdays Downtown, and founder of the Festivals and Events Association of Tucson and Southern Arizona. We have lost a good public servant but we have gained another Guardian Angel.

Additionally, the City of Tucson and Arizona Department of Economic Security are partnering to provide additional payment assistance for qualifying Tucson Water customers. Households currently enrolled in a Low-Income Assistance Program are now eligible to receive \$3,000 in additional credit to be applied to past-due bills or future bills. You must register to claim your credit before Sept. 30, or you will lose this opportunity. If you're already on the assistance program, call (520) 791-3253 to learn more and register.

CITY OF TUCSON OPENS COOLING CENTERS TO HELP COPE WITH EXTREME HEAT: With high temperatures expected to top 100 degrees for a long stretch, the City of Tucson is offering cooling centers seven days a week, from noon-4 p.m. (closed for holidays June 19 and July 4). HOUSING FIRST UPDATE: At the June 6 Mayor and Council Study Session, Brandi Champion, Housing First program director, provided updates on the first 18 months of the Housing First program. Liz Morales, Assistant City Manager, also provided updates on the Point In Time (PIT) Count, Housing Choice Vouchers (Section 8), and affordable housing development in Tucson.

In the first 18 months of the City of Tucson’s Housing First Program began:

- 1,017 people served through Housing First’s Outreach Team
- 163 people housed through Housing First’s Outreach Team
- 651 people served through Coordinated Entry Navigation
- 197 people housed through Coordinated Entry Navigation

The 2023 Point in Time Count Report for Pima County was released on May 15. Key findings show that homelessness rates have steadily increased since 2018, due to the effect of the COVID-19 pandemic and housing cost inflation on the housing crisis. However, this trend has begun to reverse with decreases in overall homelessness reported among many populations between 2022 and 2023.

Want to get paid while earning your GED?

Are you between the ages of 17 & 22?

Las Artes offers a unique learning environment for youth ages 17-22. We combine structured classroom study with community art projects that help prepare students for the General Education Development (GED) test and learn valuable job-readiness skills.

Classes are held 30 hours per week and students must attend daily. The aim is to blend the best of classroom instruction with a hands-on project where attention to detail is emphasized. Las Artes pays students a weekly stipend.

Students who meet all of the program's academic and attendance requirements can earn a bonus!



Curriculum

Students are required to complete basic education courses and an eight-week community art project. They begin by taking a placement assessment called TABE that matches their level of education with coursework.



The time frame to complete the GED, when entering at:
Level 1: 32 weeks, **Level 2:** 24 weeks, **Level 3:** 16 weeks
Placement levels are determined at the time of assessment.



Art Projects

Las Artes students create magnificent tile art murals that have beautified neighborhoods throughout Pima County.

Through an eight-week project, students work in teams on real-world projects that promote community involvement and build self-confidence. They gain a sense of pride and accomplishment, tools that are essential in developing a strong work ethic.
