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Dear Friends:

From Sept. 15 to Oct. 15, National Hispanic Heritage Month is commemorated, celebrating the histories, cultures and contributions of American citizens whose ancestors came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean and Central and South America.

The observation started in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson and was expanded by President Ronald Reagan in 1988 to cover a 30-day period, renamed National Hispanic Heritage Month.

As we honor Latino culture this month, we should reflect on what makes Latinos such a strong contributing force in America. Latinos across America have made countless positive contributions to our military, education, the arts, the economy, and the social fabric which makes our nation unique.

With over 50 million Latinos across the United States, Latinos now make up the largest minority group and represent more than \$1 trillion in buying power. Latinos also represent the fastest growing segment of the American electorate.

In Arizona, Raul Castro served as our first Latino governor in the 1970s. In 1991, Ed Pastor was the first Latino elected to represent Arizona in the U.S. Congress; today there are two Latinos in Congress: Pastor and Raul Grijalva. In a few years we have an opportunity to send our first Latino U.S. Senator to Washington.

In Tucson and Pima County, Latinos have sent a strong message by turning out to vote and leading the state in the number of Latinos that have been elected to governing bodies such as the state Legislature, Pima County government, Tucson city government, local school districts and Pima Community College's Governing Board.


The U.S. Census showed the Latino community grew by four times the national average, accounting for more than half of the total U.S. population increase of 27.3 million. Between 2000 and 2010, the Hispanic population grew by 43 percent, or four times the nation's 9.7 percent growth rate.

As we increase our population, we need to continue to increase our participation at the polls. In Tucson, during the 2013 election, which was conducted in an all vote-by-mail process, turnout still continued to increase in the South and West sides, where a majority of the Latino community resides.

According to the most recent DATOS report, Arizona foreign exports in 2013 totaled \$19.4 billion. The state's largest trading partner was Mexico - \$7.1 billion, representing 36.6 percent of the total.

During this Hispanic Heritage Month, let us reflect on where we have been but not lose sight on where we still need to go. President John F. Kennedy stated, "Ask not what your country can do for you, but what you can do for your country". The best thing we can do for our country is to register and vote.

HISPANICS RECEIVE MOST MEDALS OF HONOR

In honor of Hispanic Heritage Month, here is the list of those of Hispanic heritage, who were awarded the Medal of Honor.

The Medal of Honor was introduced during the American Civil War and is the highest military decoration presented by the United States government to a member of its armed forces. The recipient must have distinguished themselves at the risk of their own life above and beyond the call of duty in action against an enemy of the United States. Due to the nature of this medal, it is commonly presented posthumously.



Sixty-one men of Hispanic heritage have been awarded the Medal of Honor, the most of all groups. Of the Sixty-one Medals of Honor presented to Hispanics, two were presented to members of the United States Navy, thirteen to members of the United States Marine Corps and forty-six to members of the United States Army. Forty-two Medals of Honor were presented posthumously.

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CHERRYBELL UPDATE

Contrary to what was reported recently, the battle to keep the Cherrybell Processing is not over with.

Three years ago, our City got the announcement from the United States Postal Service (USPS) that the Cherrybell Post Office and Processing Center was on a list of USPS facilities that may be closed down.



A public outcry and lobbying by members of the Arizona Congressional Delegation, work by Tucson's federal lobbyists and protests from the business community has kept Cherrybell from closing, despite the announcements from local postal officials and the periodic news stories from Tucson's only daily newspaper.

Here is a chronology of the effort to keep Cherrybell open. Unlike what has been reported, it has been a prolonged effort:

September 15, 2011 – USPS issued notice that they were conducting an Area Mail Processing (AMP) feasibility study on the consolidation of “all originating and/or destinating distribution operations...” “... for the purpose of improving operational efficiency and/or service.” The statement continues as “The Postal Service is conducting an AMP feasibility study to determine if efficiency could be increased by consolidating mail processing operations currently performed at the Tucson AZ Processing and Distribution Center with those performed at the Phoenix AZ Processing and Distribution Center.

December 12, 2011 – USPS released the results of its AMP study stating that “the initial results of the study support the business case for consolidation.”

December 14, 2011 – USPS agreed to impose a moratorium on closing or consolidating post offices and mail processing facilities prior to May 15, 2012, to give Congress and the Administration the opportunity to enact an alternative plan.

CHERRYBELL UPDATE (Cont.)

December 28, 2011—USPS holds public hearing in Tucson where over 600 community members and 50 businesses attended.

January 12, 2012 – Public Comment Period Closes.

February 23, 2012 – USPS released announcement indicating “the Postal Service has made the decision to move all mail processing operations from the Tucson Processing & Distribution Center to the Phoenix Processing & Distribution Center.” However, they announced that it would not take effect until after the moratorium was lifted that was to last until May 15, 2012.

May 14, 2012 – Following intense Congressional pressure from the Arizona delegation, the City of Tucson, and other Senate and House members, USPS announced it will extend the moratorium scheduled to end on May 15, 2013.

February 22, 2013 - USPS announced it will begin Phase I consolidation referred to as the “small primary distribution” of Tucson P&DC beginning on February 25, 2013. Plans for implementation of phase 2, full consolidation, were simultaneously announced to take effect around May 2014. Unlike the prior proposal of full closure all at once, the consolidation was intended to be phased over a year.

February 22, 2013 – Tucson postmark ends.

February 25, 2013 – Phase I consolidation of Tucson P&DC begins.

May 2013 - Arizona Legislature passes resolution keeping Cherrybell open.

July 2013 – Bills keeping postal processing centers open are introduced in both Houses of Congress.

September 13, 2013 - Postmaster General Donahoe testifies before the Senate Homeland Security Committee and pledged not to close post offices or mail processing centers before Congress acted on postal reform.

January 2014 – June 2014 - The Postal Service maintained its temporary moratorium on proceeding with the second phase of closures of mail processing centers and implementing any changes to service standards.

As such, closure of the Tucson Cherrybell Postal Processing Center was on hold. Should USPS decide to reinstate the service standard changes, such as eliminating overnight mail delivery, they are required to give 90-day notice in the Federal Register.

June 30, 2014 – U.S. Postmaster General Donahoe announces continuation of Phase 1 and 2 consolidations of 82 postal processing facilities, including Tucson Processing and Distribution Center.

July 2014 – Councilmember Richard Fimbres meets with officials of the U.S. House Government and Oversight Committee, Congressional staff, administration officials and other individuals about postal reform and Cherrybell.

CHERRYBELL (Cont)

August 14, 2014 - A group of 50 Senators sent a letter to leaders of the appropriations committee asking that the committee prohibit the Postal Service from moving forward with its plan to close 80 processing facilities. Specifically, the letter asked that a one-year moratorium on consolidations be included in any omnibus appropriations bill or continuing resolution for FY2015.

The City is in the process of again forming the working group that so effectively made the case for Tucson and Southern Arizona over the past few years, including the City of Tucson, local businesses and business groups, the Tohono O'odham Nation and Pascua Yaqui Tribe, the regional governments and the Pima County Recorder's Office.

The joint efforts in the past helped turn the situation from an immediate threat of closure to a phased approach that has kept jobs in Tucson.

The business community of Tucson and Southern Arizona, with more than 26,000 businesses, needs to step up as well and have their voices heard on this issue since this could affect their bottom line operations.

While meeting with the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee about the status of discussion on postal reform and the Postmaster General's recent announcement, they emphasized that invigorating the effort collectively, we can continue to make the strongest appeal for Cherrybell, as we have done since December 2011, when the first announcement of closure was made.

Call your Member of Congress and Senator McCain and Senator Flake's office about Cherrybell and how this is more than just some jobs at a post office, but about Southern Arizona and our state.

MAYOR AND COUNCIL SPECIAL MEETING ON CITY MANAGER SELECTION PROCESS

The Mayor and Council held a special town hall meeting on September 11, to get feedback from the public on what they want for the next City Manager.

Those who spoke at this meeting stated the need for the community to be a part of the selection process. The consultant will take the input given and use it as part of the application process. Bob Murray will review the submissions and reduce the list of potential candidates. The Mayor and Council will be forming a citizens panel to review the shortlist.

CITY OF TUCSON CHARTER REVIEW COMMITTEE UPDATE

The City of Tucson Charter Review Committee has begun their work on reviewing the City Charter and potentially bringing recommendations for possible changes for Mayor and Council consideration to place on a respective city ballot for voter consideration.

WARD 5 BUSINESS UPDATE



A ribbon cutting ceremony took place for VXI Global Solutions, Friday, September 12. VXI is located at 6730 S. Tucson Boulevard in Ward 5. Mayor Jonathan Rothschild and Councilmember Richard Fimbres were present.

This is a new contact center, which is now open and fully operational. The beautifully appointed building is a state-of-the-art call center with a capacity of over 400 seats, and VXI has already hired over 150 employees from the Tucson area.

“I want to thank everyone who was involved in this effort to bring VXI Global Solutions to Ward 5, Tucson and Pima County,” commented Tucson Councilmember Richard Fimbres (Ward 5). “This shows that our community can roll up its sleeves and come together and succeed as we have with VXI.”

“Ward 5 and the City of Tucson is focused on developing businesses and creating jobs,” said Councilmember Fimbres, “with the addition of VXI, more than 1,500 new jobs have been created alone in Ward 5 alone, which shows that Tucson welcomes business.”

The ribbon cutting is just the latest of many new businesses that have been created or expanded their operations in Ward 5. Costco, Curacao, Body Central, Perfection Industries, Purcell Tires, , Mattress Firm, Sprint, McDonald’s, Modular Mining Industries, Goodwill, and Quik Trip stores have opened their doors in the Ward.



CAID Industries just received a City of Tucson Primary Jobs Incentive Package for the construction of their new offices, it will be an additional 30 jobs that pay more than \$52,500 a year.

CAID Industries built a \$5.5 million new manufacturing facility on the corner of Tucson Boulevard and Ganley Road in Ward 5.

The building houses 50,000 square feet of manufacturing capacity and office space. The new facility will allow CAID Industries to increase employment in the areas of engineering, project management, quality assurance, welding, administration, and machine operations.

The purpose of the Primary Jobs Incentive Program is to create new primary, high-wage, non-retail jobs within Tucson’s export industries.

It is intended to both attract new employers to Tucson and encourage existing businesses to expand their operations.

CAID had previously expanded their operations twice before, thanks to the efforts of the Ward 5 Council office.

Culver's Restaurant opened their latest location at the Tucson Marketplace at the Bridges in Ward 5, adding 65 more jobs to Tucson's workforce.

The founder of Culver's, Mr. Craig Culver will be coming to Tucson to formally dedicate the new location on October 10. For more information, go online to culvers.com.

Fed-Ex Ground is in the midst of constructing a new facility by the Tucson Airport, located in Ward 5, which will add 160 more jobs, when the facility opens July 1, 2015.

"The good citizens of Tucson want to see us putting people back to work," Councilmember Fimbres said.

WARD 5 CONTINUES TO GROW THROUGH ANNEXATION

At the September 9, Mayor and Council meeting, Ward 5 grew by nearly 2,500 acres. The Mayor and Council unanimously approved the annexation of four commercial parcels (currently not developed) surrounding the Tucson Airport.

This annexation is beneficial as it allows a firm or developer to be considered for City of Tucson economic development incentives.

Also at this meeting was the finalization of the city zoning for the April annexation of the Empire Vista area.

GEDD UPDATE

Three years of work and effort on the Global Economic Development District (GEDD) was finalized at the September 9 Mayor and Council meeting. The GEDD is a plan to define and implement economic development strategies that integrate local, national, and international commercial opportunities along the I-19, I-10, Old Vail Road and Valencia commercial and transportation corridors. The GEDD is located in Wards 1, 4 and 5.

The GEDD proximity and accessibility to Mexico, Texas and California markets through both rail and road is yet another asset of the GEDD. Additionally, Tucson is considered a border zone by Arizona International Development Authority (AIDA) standards which, if funded, would give Tucson access to infrastructure funding options.

The GEDD incentive also leverages City of Tucson assets such as water infrastructure and major capital improvement plans. Partners include the Port of Tucson, UA Tech Parks, Diamond Ventures, and the Ashland Group. Working together with TTC partners will allow the City to leverage the group's vast investor network and the group's knowledge in project development. In turn the incentives proposed below will give the TTC group another tool to attract business to the area.

"This new effort will help the City of Tucson compete for international businesses," said Councilmember Richard Fimbres. "I want to thank my colleagues on the Council for their work on the GEDD."

The Office of Economic Initiatives will oversee the GEDD,
