## A Message From Steve...12/19/2012



Why does it take carnage to bring us together as a nation and/or community? Everybody who has committed to the January 7<sup>th</sup> Town Hall/Roast event shares the united goal of showing that we, as elected employees of you all, want to put aside barriers and work together for the greater good of Tucson, the State and Nation. It's our hope that all in attendance will share in that spirit.

The prayers of the Ward 6 staff go out to the victims, families and all involved in the recent shootings that took place at Sandy Hook Elementary School.

### Firearm Memorial

To that end, on Tuesday, Mayor and Council unanimously gave direction to the City Attorney to draft language for a memorial that reflects this letter co-authored by Council Member Uhlich and myself:

ARS 13-3108 restricts the ability of local jurisdictions to adopt ordinances related to the use or possession of firearms that are more restrictive than what is provided for in State Statute. The relevant portions of that Statute read as follows:

### 13-3108. Firearms regulated by state; state preemption; violation; classification; definition

*D. A political subdivision of this state shall not enact any rule or ordinance that relates to firearms and is more prohibitive than or that has a penalty that is greater than any state law penalty. A political subdivision's rule or ordinance that relates to firearms and that is inconsistent with or more restrictive than state law, whether enacted before or after the effective date of the amendment to this section, is null and void.*

The result of this legislation is that, despite the clear will of our constituents, the City is precluded from preventing firearms in public buildings unless strict storage measures are taken, precluded from preventing firearms in public parks, and prevented from opting out of legislation that may once again going to be proposed that will allow firearms on public school and college campuses. Mayor and Council hereby direct staff to prepare a Memorial reflecting this

bodies desire that the State Legislature rescind Section D of ARS 13-3108 as a first order of business in the 2013 session, and to forward the Memorial to the Arizona League of Cities and Towns requesting the broad support in this effort from that group.

The December 12<sup>th</sup> Capitol Times reported that State Senator Steve Smith (Maricopa – R) is getting ready to propose legislation that expands the ability to carry guns in public buildings and is also looking into the possibility of running the guns-on-campus bill again this year (didn't get past the Governor last time). It's worthwhile to get out ahead of those pieces of wisdom before they gain momentum.

We all know that no single law or ordinance will solve the problem we are having with mass shootings. On NPR last week I heard the statistic that of the dozen most deadly mass shootings in U.S. history, fully one-half of them have occurred in the last five years. We've got to do more than just lower our flags when another one happens. Taking back local decision making authority from the State will be huge in our ability to adopt ordinances that reflect the will of this community and not necessarily that of Mesa or Maricopa.

We are also cognizant that there is a significant need to address the needs of the severely mentally ill in our communities. I know that you'll be seeing and hearing more about that, from multiple levels of government in the days ahead. I'm personally hopeful that the discussion of the SMI in our communities will also look into the effects of the "medications" we're prescribing. A quick check of the internet shows that side effects, particularly during withdrawal from some of these drugs can become problematic. From the work of Dr. David Healy:

### Legislative Agenda

In addition to the Memorial we're sending to the Legislature and to the League of Cities and Towns, we also put together a list of other legislative concerns that our local lobbyists and our D.C. staff will be tackling on our (your) behalf. Basic to the overall thrust of them is to protect shared revenues coming from the State, and to protect local authority and decision making (consistent with the firearm Memorial). In January we'll begin to put together our list of legislative priorities for passing along to our folks in both Phoenix, and to our D.C. staff. Some examples of areas that may be up for discussion include:

### State Legislative Priorities

- Support the restoration of Highway User Revenue Fund (HURF) to local governments (important for roadway repairs and other transportation work).
- Support for immediate improvements to extend local highway capacity, particularly I-19 south of I-10 and eastbound I-10 (drainage, traffic congestion and economic development issues)
- Support Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) legislation (up-front funding for energy efficiency upgrades to residential property)
- Support for State film incentives (jobs bill for the film industry)
- Support funding for education (critical for economic development in our community)
- Support stringent penalties for copper wire theft (over a \$2B problem State-wide)
- Support the restoration of the Local Transportation Assistance Fund (LTAF). (Key for restoring lost transit funding that used to come from the State – lottery money.)
- Support legislation that overturns or makes significant changes to legislation that consolidates municipal elections with State elections. (Again, consistent with the effort to keep decision making as close to local as possible. The Legislature still has to clean up the mess they created last session by mandating only even-numbered year elections – we'll see how they fix that, but want them to quit meddling.)
- Support funding for State parks (tourism industry issue – as well as quality of life for locals.)
- Support for a State-wide ban on text messaging while driving. (Being co-promoted by Senators Farley and Melvin – no official sponsors, yet. They're playing catch-up to what we did last year.)
- Support flexibility for Rio Nuevo Tax Increment Financing (TIF) expenditures. (Opens the door to some downtown development spending, short of our having to get a hotel and TCC project going – clearly needs fine tuning so that it does not simply become a

- Support for legislation that would collect State and local sales tax for internet purchases (evens the playing field between bricks & mortar retail vs. on-line sellers)
- Support a ban of synthetic drugs to minors (huge growing problem with youth misusing 'legal' substances to get high)
- Support funding for apprenticeship programs that issue Journeyman Electrician Certifications (expand the workforce development effort)

#### **Federal Legislative Priorities**

- Support for funding and infrastructure for Southern Arizona ports of entry (State and Federal) (huge commerce potential)
- Support for keeping the Tomato Suspension Agreement intact (International trade and cross-border relations issue)
- Support funding for historic preservation (federal dollars to preserve and maintain historic structures)
- Support action to ensure Davis-Monthan Air Force Base remains open and viable (one of our three economic drivers locally)
- Support action to ensure the Cherrybell Post Office and Processing Center remains open and viable (jobs retention, as well as quality of service to our constituents)

Our thanks go out to Terry Bracy and the D.C. staff, as well as to our local liaisons, Andrew Greenhill and Adriana Marinez for their work on behalf of the residents of the City and region.

#### **Water Conservation, again**

A couple of weeks ago we gave direction to staff to set up a public hearing related to the adoption of several International Building Codes. A part of that was to continue our discussion of water conservation, and how to tweak the current Greywater Ordinance in ways that may result in it being more attractive to residential users. The December 4<sup>th</sup> discussion made it clear that, with respect to the Greywater issue, we want to have staff work directly with council offices and come up with some options. Included in those options will be other water conservation ideas that may get us more bang for our buck.

Here's the Clerk's recounting of the specific motion from the 4<sup>th</sup>:

A substitute motion was made by Vice Mayor Kozachik, duly seconded, and PASSED by a roll call vote of 7 to 0, to move the Building Code forward including the Uniformed Plumbing Code as suggested by staff and direct staff to work with the Council offices to return with a menu of conservation proposals including changes to the gray water proposal by April 1, 2013.

Pretty clear. On Tuesday we heard from supporters of the Greywater Ordinance that there's a recognition of a need to make some improvements in it, but to avoid tossing it out altogether. I believe that reflects the will of the Council, too. We'll all be sharing our thoughts with Staff between now and April. I'm certain that we'd all be interested in your perspectives, as well so they can form a part of the overall decision making process we'll go through.

#### **Neighborhood Preservation Ordinance**

The Neighborhood Preservation Ordinance (NPO) was first adopted in 2003. In general, it includes standards that govern property maintenance, storage issues around properties,

and minimum standards for common hazardous and blighting conditions and nuisances. On Tuesday, we discussed some changes that are being proposed to the NPO and gave staff the go-ahead to schedule a public hearing so we can hear from you before finally adopting those changes.

There are six areas in which we're considering new standards. Those are:

1. Defining "outdoor storage" so that it includes motor vehicles that are being kept in the front or side yards for over two years.
2. Maintenance requirements related to the exterior of the building. Things such as functionality and appearance of windows, roof drainage and structural members.
3. Maintenance of paved sidewalks, stairs and steps on the property.
4. Junked or inoperable motor vehicles and where they can be stored.
5. Restricting the number of yard sales that can be held on a given property to twice every three months, three times every six months or four times annually.
6. Limiting the number of commercial vehicles permitted on a residential property to a single passenger car, van or pick up – and limiting its size to under 20' in length and 7' in height.

I have concerns in two areas. First, we need to ensure our Ordinance doesn't bind people who are having financial challenges to making external repairs to their homes. What we were assured was that the City routinely puts such people in touch with possible funding sources, or engages neighbor-to-neighbor programs to assist. We should be about maintaining high standards in our residential areas, and yet we should also be willing to take into account people needing a temporary break when they fall on hard times.

Several of us were also concerned that the one commercial vehicle limit might result in unintended consequences in some cases. With so many two earner families, it's not clear that a limit of one vehicle is reasonable.

One other area that we talked about was the use of Cargo Storage Containers for storage of materials, whether in the front, side or rear yards. There are concerns over aesthetics, and also the extent to which leaching of lead paint into the soil/water table might be something we want to address. People can buy a Tuff Shed that doesn't bring along with it those other issues. Staff confirmed that there are provisions in the land use code to address using such structures as means of permanent storage.

We're going to set the date for the public hearing on these changes to the NPO. We need to hear from you so what we adopt is consistent with the desires of the community. I'll make sure we get the word out in advance of that hearing. Ahead of that though, if you have comments on the proposals, feel free to share them with us by email.

### **Broadway –Sunshine Mile**

I'm not sure I like the designation, but much of the architecture along the Broadway corridor that is in the way of the RTA's planned demolition is "mid-modern" and therefore reflects that time era in the history of Tucson's growth. Since I was alive and kicking back then, I guess I'm not any more thrilled with being considered "vintage" as I am having the music I listen to on the radio being called "Oldies." But what's more important than the titles is what we're doing with the assets.

I was born the year the corridor segment we're talking about widening received its name; The Sunshine Mile.

They even had a contest to name it – Congratulations to Staff Sgt. Becker for winning (belatedly).

Last week, thanks to the help of Jude Cook and others, the corridor celebrated its rich tradition by holding open houses and sales events in 34 of the businesses that are housed in these older structures, but are still putting them to good use. You'll recognize some of these:

The Arizona Bank – 1964



and of course, Hirsch's Shoes – 1954. That is not me standing in the picture, by the way.

On Tuesday, with the help of a presentation by Demion Clinco from the Historic Preservation Office, we demonstrated clearly the impact the proposed widening of Broadway would have on these structures. The short message is that they'd largely be demolished and replaced with asphalt.

It is immensely important that the Citizen's Task Force that is working on design proposals for the Broadway project be given the flexibility, and the authority to study design options that will maintain the functionality of the corridor, even if that means containing the design to within the existing cross-width. Until Tuesday, staff had publicly maintained that they felt 150' was the necessary starting point for the design discussion because that number appears in the Major Streets and Routes document adopted by the City. On Tuesday we came away from this presentation with an understanding, publicly stated by staff that the CTF is not limited to that cross-width, and that they can come up with a solution to the roadway travel needs that is more narrow than 150', and that saves money in the process. The caveat is simply that we be able to show the taxpayers and travelling public that what is finally designed is better than what had originally been proposed. If that happens, we'll then go back and amend the MS&R plan to show the newly designed cross width.



We're making progress in this conversation.

### **TUSD/City Council**

Over the past three years, TUSD has been wrestling with the issue of school closures, budget constraints and how to manage and maintain the properties they've already had to shut down. It's an extremely difficult issue, not only for the Board, but for the community as well – on multiple levels.

After last Friday's events in Connecticut, the Board now has two significant issues to consider:

- School Closures
- School Safety

I've spoken with two of the current Board members about this and to both of the two newly elected members (not sworn in yet, so no Open Meetings violation there). I know that other Council Members have also had contact with the Board, urging our support of their difficult decisions. We're all committed to continuing the dialogue, recognizing that these issues are of concern to the wider community.

The issue of closures has a direct impact on our neighborhoods. It also raises various land use concerns. Those touch on zoning/rezoning questions that the Board has no jurisdiction over. On the other hand, the M&C have no jurisdiction over the disposition of the schools; that is, whether to close them, how to dispose of them, and the matter of preservation and maintenance of the buildings and school grounds.

For the past year, I've been meeting with TPD, School District officials, City staffers and residents from three University area neighborhoods to talk about safety and behavioral issues with specific reference to Tucson High School. Those meetings have yielded some good results. Following the recent shootings, TPD took extra safety measures around area schools. The topic of school safety and response protocols is certainly an issue of mutual concern.

Clearly these issues touch both them, and us. And by extension, it impacts all of our constituents. We need to be working on this together. Along with the land use element, you may hear funding be a topic of discussion at the January 7<sup>th</sup> forum. That's a State, and to a lesser degree a Federal issue. It's good that several of us in both of these governing bodies are in touch in a productive and supportive way.

### **Public Safety New Year's "Thank You" Party**

It has been a challenging year for each of our three Public Safety agencies. Police has had multiple officer-involved shootings, the most severe being the recent shooting of Sgt. Carpenter. His recovery is going along well. Fire suffered the temporary loss of Chief Critchley due to a stroke, but came together as a family and maintained their superior work in the community. Chief is also recovering well. And the 911 Dispatch Center has gone through the roll-over to a




new dispatch system, new management and new scheduling discussions. And through it all, the front-line workers have maintained a professional approach to serving the Tucson public.

And all three agencies have done their work under strained budgetary conditions.
